NFLA HAS MEETING

Mr. Earl A. Moore of Hood River and Mr. William D. Ketchum of The Dalles have returned from Spokane where they represented The Dalles National Farm Loan association at the second annual conference of NFLA representatives. The meeting was attended by two delegates from each of 65 associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

National farm loan associations are the field units of the cooperative land bank system and handle the making and servicing of land bank loans in their respective localities. The Dalles association serves farmers and ranchers in Hood River, Gilliam, Sherman, Wasco and Wheeler counties.

Henry Matthew, president of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, reported to the delegates that new loans in excess of \$16,000,000 were written during the past year. This was the largest volume for any one year since 1934. Mr. Matthew pointed out that land bank loans are still being written at 4% interest, the lowest rate in the history of farm financing. He also advised the NFLA representatives that the bank will pay its eighth consecutive dividend this year to the national farm loan association.

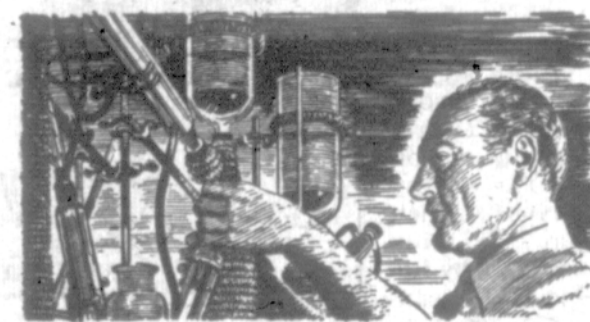

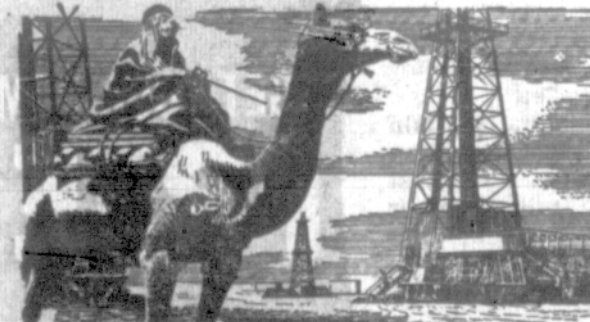
