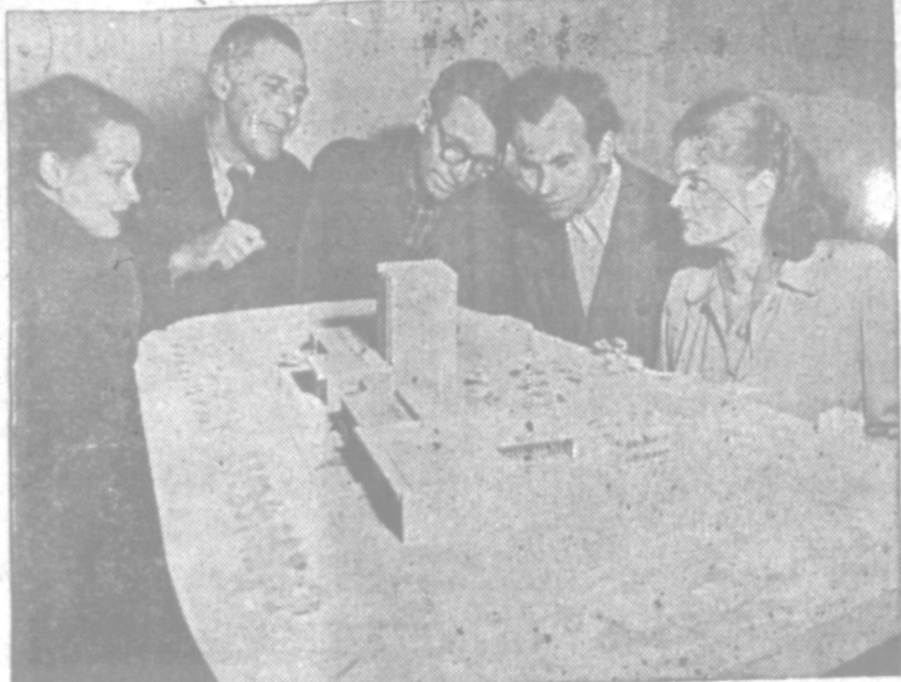


CONDENSED REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS OF DECEMBER 5, 1951 TERM OF COUNTY COURT

Claims against all funds allowed as presented.
 County Treasurer's monthly financial statement showing all fund balances as of November 30, 1951 presented and filed.
 County Clerk's monthly statement showing all General Road Fund budget balances as of Nov. 1, 1951, presented, approved and filed.
 County Road Foreman presents report on gasoline consumption during November 1951. Report approved and filed.
 County Road Foreman presents report on gravel spread out of special fund. Report approved and filed.



WEST BERLIN UNIVERSITY . . . A group of students look at the prize-winning model of the new West Berlin free university which is expected to be constructed for their use within a year. Funds for the construction of the building were made available through a Ford foundation grant of \$1,309,500 made last July. The university was designed by Berlin architects Frans Heinrich and Gustav Muller. The library will hold one million books and the lecture hall 1.5 million students.

County Treasurer appears before County Court asking permission to buy adding machine. Court grants permission; price not to exceed \$200 with trade in allowance of old machine.
 Application for County Assessor read from Clair Balzer; appointment made of Mr. Balzer effective from December 1, 1951 to next general election.
 Durward Helyer asks Court for improvement of his road. Matter referred to County Road Foreman.
 Bond of Marie Hoskinson, County Clerk, approved, signed and filed.
 Resignation of A. J. Bucholtz as Fair Board Member read second time; Resignation accepted. Appointment of new member deferred to a later date.

Giles French appears before court and explains the cost of making a booklet describing the natural resources of Sherman County, and the distribution of same. Court favors issuing such booklet.

T. Lester Johnson & Giles French explain to Court money held in abeyance by Co. Treasurer belonging to Wasco, Grass Valley & Moro from special road tax. County Treasurer instructed to disburse money on hand to the various cities.
 T. Lester Johnson appears on behalf of City of Wasco asking for gravel from Dehler pit if any available. Co. Court agrees to sell gravel to city.
 Deed presented to Court for approval and signatures, Sherman County to City of Wasco, conveying Lot 7 in Block 1 of Armsworthy's Add. to City of Wasco.
 Re: Granting of easement for road over private property to Alfred Kock; Clerk instructed to

notify those interested to appear at Jan. 2, 1952 meeting to discuss possibility of establishing such road.
 No further matters being at issue adjournment ensued.

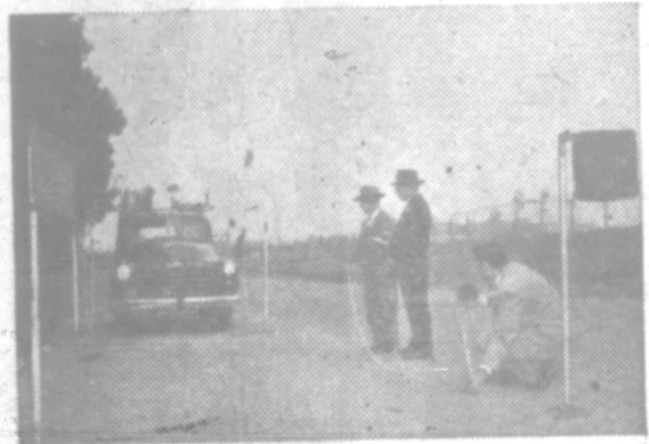

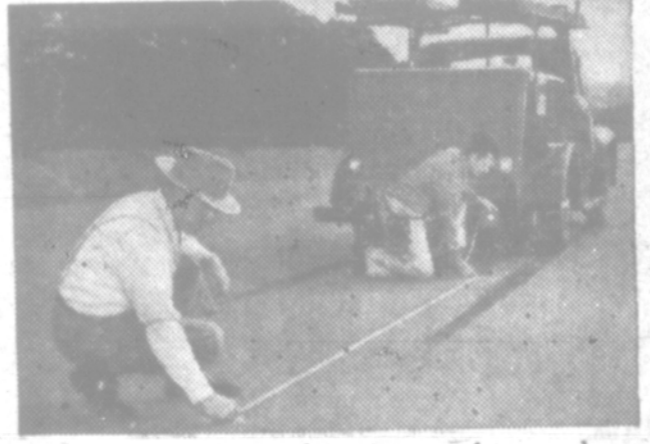
