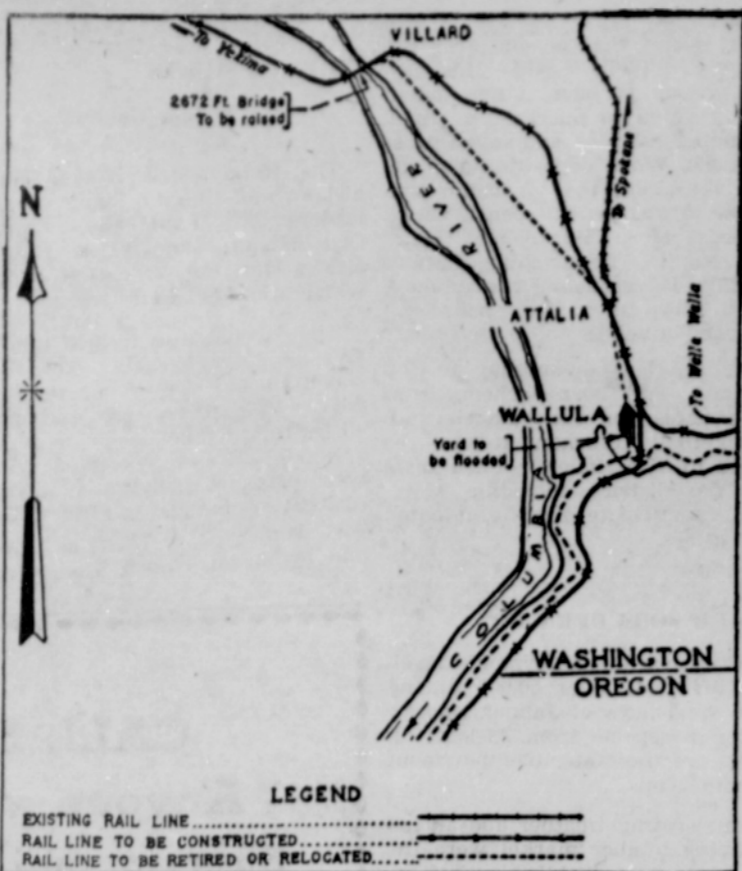

The Rev. and Mrs. A. L. Kintner were dinner guests Monday evening of the Ivan Blaggs celebrating Mr. Blaggs' birthday.

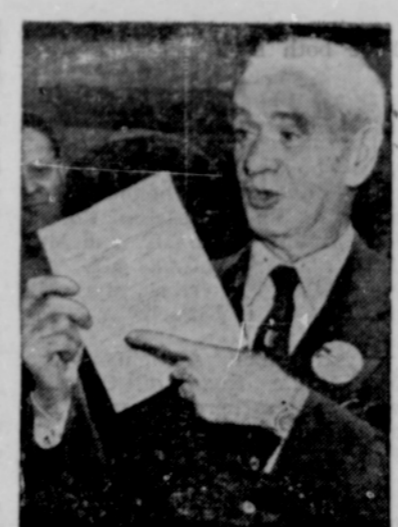
