PMA MAKES REVIEWS

Nineteen conservation practices were adopted for the 1952 ACP practice payment handbook by county and community PMA committees and other interested farmers Wednesday at the county courthouse. Perennial weed control was again given a priority for payment by committees.

Allocation to Sherman county for the 1952 ACP program amounts to \$41,000. Last year \$48,000 was allotted to the county. Perennial weed control took the largest payment during 1951 with 80 farmers receiving \$29,200 assistance in applying 209,000 pounds sodium chlorate and 5000 pounds 2,4-D for control of morning glory, Russian knapweed, and white top.

Farmers desiring to participate in the 1952 ACP program must contact the PMA office for prior approval and recommendations. Permanent type practices will receive engineering service from the federal soil conservation service.

Crop residue management was again accepted by committees. Last year \$8,100 was paid for trashy fallow to 30 farms on 13,500 acres. Rates of payment for this practice are \$1 per acre for 2000 pounds, 75 cents per acre for 1000 pounds and 50 cents per acre for between 750 and 1000 pounds of straw per acre on the surface.

Other practices accepted by

the committees for assistance to farmers were sod waterways, erosion and stock water dams, establishment of contour and cross slope strip cropping, contour and cross slope farming, seeding permanent pastures, control of competitive plants on range, and wells, springs, water storage facilities, and dams for livestock.

217 LOSE LICENSES

Two hundred seventeen Oregon drivers had driving licenses suspended during January after court convictions of driving while intoxicated and reckless driving.

The suspensions were handed out by Secretary of State's office, which also reported suspensions of 19 licenses for failure to report an accident and 11 for violation of the basic rule.

The office said motor vehicle operators were convicted of 2,783 moving traffic violations during the month, a slight increase over the number recorded in December.
