Ben Musa Announces Candidacy For Congressional Seat

Ben Musa, State Senator from Hood River and Wasco counties, announced Wednesday his intention to seek the Democratic nomination for Congressman from the Second Oregon District.

Musa is completing his fourth year as state senator and has been chairman of the insurance committee, vice-chairman of public utilities and commerce, and local government committees. He has been active in working for state tax reforms. As a minority member of the senate tax committee he worked for more practical state income tax laws and urged creation of a State Board of Tax Appeals.

Musa is a certified public accountant in The Dalles. Before entering private practice he was with the Bureau of Internal Revenue and in 1941-42 was Chief Zone Deputy Collector for Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson, Sherman, Wasco and Hood River counties. Prior to his federal service he ranched with a brother at Mitchell.

In seeking the nomination he said he favored:

- "A realistic recognition of this district's mining problems and potentials, and sensible relief and assistance in promoting mineral deposit development."
- "Continued expansion of Columbia River development."

"Advantages for the fruit grower and row crop farmer now enjoyed by the major agricultural producers."
 "Modernization of federal tax collection procedures."
 "Elimination of duplicating facilities and services in government."
 His slogan will be: "An Independent Democrat."

Musa is 46 years old, born in Clackamas county, is married and has two sons. He is treasurer of local Red Cross chapter, past president of Dalles Kiwanis club, ex-director Dalles Chamber of Commerce, past officer of Grange and member of Oregon Society of Certified Public Accountants.
