### Public Hearing On Agriculture Set For 18th at The Dalles

A public hearing on agricultural wage rates in Wasco county, will be held in The Dalles, April 18, it has been announced by Leo Kotin, chairman of the Regional Wage Stabilization Board.

This board will hold the hearings in the council chambers of the city hall beginning at 10 a. m. The hearing was requested by the Wasco County Fruit and Produce league representing The Dalles Cooperative Growers, Columbia Fruit Growers, the Stadelman Fruit company, and other independent growers.

Agricultural employers, workers, their representatives and all other interested persons are invited to appear and testify or fill written statements regarding the need for establishing area ceiling wage rates for agricultural labor, worker output, and wage rates paid in 1950, 1951, and in the present season for various crops, farm operations and areas which might be affected, directly or indirectly, by ceiling wage rates.

Interested agricultural employers and their employees in the area will be heard. In addition persons in this and in nearby areas who consider that they might be affected by a determination covering such ceilings are also invited to appear.

A regional wage stabilization board may make an area ceiling determination when the self-administered wage increases authorized by general wage regulation No. 11, as revised by resolution of the National Stabilization board on March 18, 1952 are not large enough to attract or re-

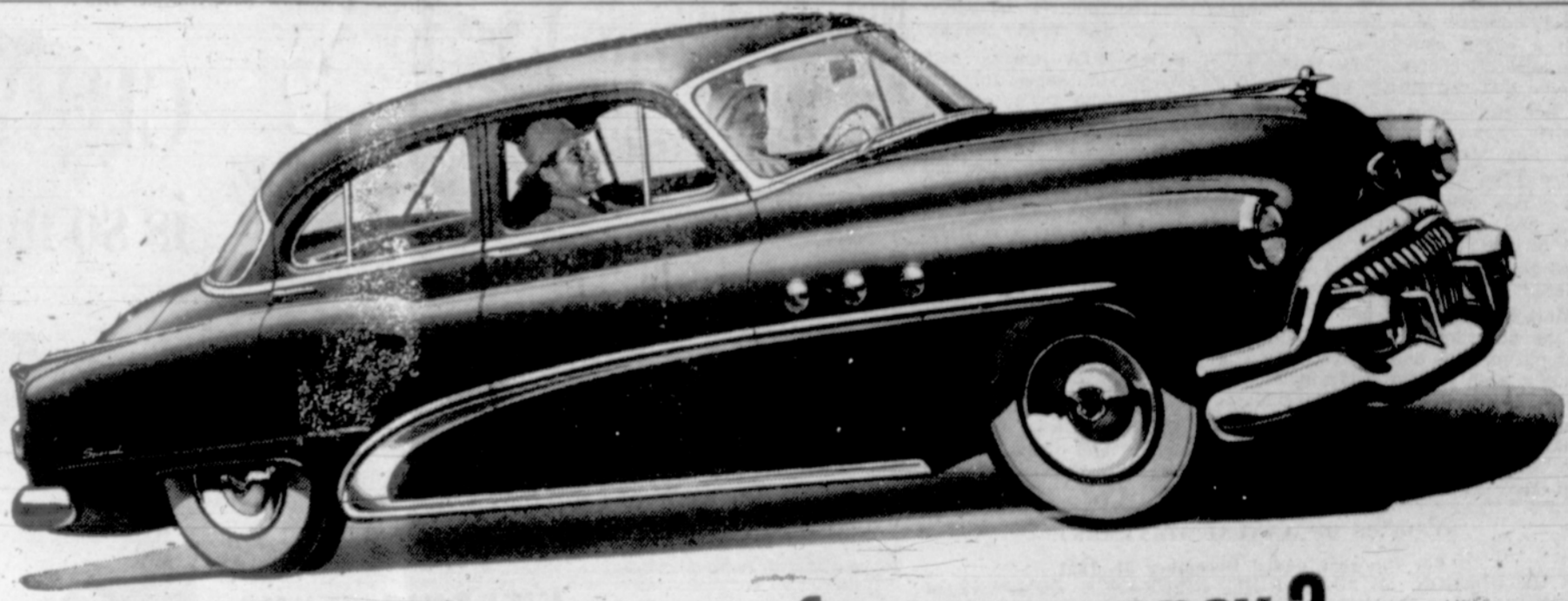
