COUNTY RAMBLIN'S

Considerable concern has been shown in the damage inflicted to Sherman county lawns by night crawlers. At present there is no definite treatment that will rid your lawn of them indefinitely. Successful control, however, has been accomplished for a few months by use of 10 percent DDT dusts.

Application may be made with a hand duster. Particular attention should be paid to any dead leaves and organic matter on the lawn. When the worms come up at night and crawl through the dust they pick up enough DDT to kill them. A repeat application of the dust should be made seven to ten days following the first.

Potato seed piece decay causes loss to most home gardeners. This loss can be stopped by fungicide treatment. A satisfactory method is as follows:

Mercuric chloride dip for seed pieces two or four weeks before cutting using four ounces to thirty gallons of water soaking entire tuber for one to two hours

(uncut tubers only). Upon cutting all seed pieces should then receive a Phygon dip (Arsen is one trade name) at a one pound in ten gallons of water. This should be done immediately after cutting and only as a dip.

The Wage Stabilization Board has scheduled a hearing Friday, April 18 10 a. m. in the City Council building, The Dalles. Consideration will be given to wage ceiling rates in the Wasco county surrounding areas. Sherman county farmers concerned regarding the present ceiling rates might well be represented to present the situation in this county.

Annual weed spray plots were established last week on the May-Bruckert ranch with the assistance of Bill Hall, Sherman branch experiment station. Applications were made using 2,4-D at 1 1/2 and two pints per acre and using two types of spreader sticker commercially available. The newer weed killer 2,4-5T was also applied in combination with 2,4-D at 1/2 pint and one pint rates. C.M.V., a new soil sterilant, which may have some selectivity to plants was applied at two rates. Two types of checks were left, hand weeded and weedy.

The spring cereal nursery for the Grass Valley and Kent area has recently been established on the Kenneth Sather farm in cooperation with Sherman branch station. Varieties planted were wheat: Federation, Idaed, Comet, Comet-Sunset cross, and White Fed 38; Barley, Meloy, Flynn 37, Gem, Harlan, and a variety designated as 410206, and oat varieties, Carleton, Cody and Andrew. Wheat varieties Marfed and Hard Federation 31 and barley varieties Hannchen and Bonneville have been dropped from the plots since they are not desirable. Harlan barley and the Hyman-Orfed cross are new varieties in the nursery this year.

This is the third year for the nursery in the Kent area. A fall nursery has also been established under approximately the same conditions. I would like to encourage all farmers in this area to inspect this nursery to observe the varieties being grown. Yield information giving three year averages will be available following harvest this year.
