clean seed is to begin with a clean field. Most legume seed crops are inspected in the seedling state for certification in Oregon. The main reason for this seedling inspection is to check for volunteer crop plants and for proper field isolation. Fields must be free of volunteer plants of the crop to be grown for certification.

To avoid expensive mistakes, Thompson suggests growers study the certification rules carefully. Complete rules for certification are on file in the county extension agent's office.

The U. S. department of agriculture has announced a loan program for wool on the national average support level of 54.2 cents per pound of wool, grease basis, for the 1952-53 marketing year. Loans will be available to producers by the CCC through handlers who represent producers or producer pools. County sheep men desiring further information should contact the county PMA office regarding the new loan program.

Pressure canner gauge testing service is available through the county agent's office.

Four-H summer school, an annual event at Oregon State college, is scheduled for two weeks in mid June. Organizations or individuals desiring to participate in presenting scholarships to worthy club youngsters in agriculture or home economic projects should contact this office prior to May 15. 20 club members participated in the 1951 summer school. and Safeway Stores, respectively. The United States department of agriculture is proposing to regulate the interstate movement of animals infested with brucellosis or paratuberculosis. Only animals which have been found brucellosis free or vaccinated will be permitted to go to points of slaughter, if shipped over state lines. The government is tightening up all along the line in combating livestock diseases.

The March 1952 Hunter's report of the fish and wildlife service lists Jimmy Jones, county trapper, with one coyote and one bobcat. Farm people having trouble with these predator animals should contact Mr. Jones by card at Grass Valley.

Increased freight rates upon grain products by action of the Interstate Commerce commission will become effective May 17, 1952. The increases upon all commodities are to become effective May 2, 1952. The increase upon grain and grain products rates is 12 percent in lieu of 6 percent established last September. The increase upon other traffic is quite generally 15 percent.

The 1952 agricultural conservation program handbook for Sher-

man county was recently mailed to farmers. The ACP program is part of the production and marketing administrations administered by county and community committees. General program provisions and operation are explained in the handbook. Nineteen practices have been included in the new handbook to assist county farmers in their conservation programs. 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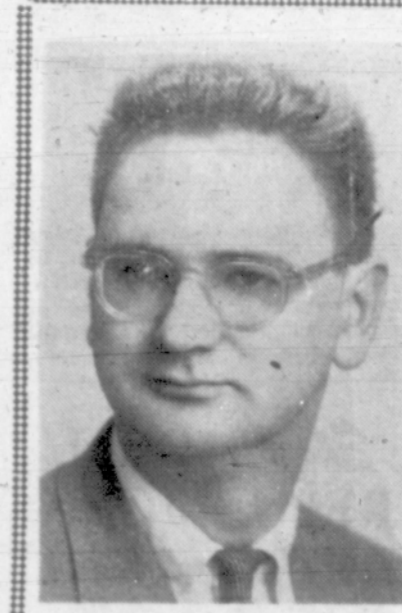

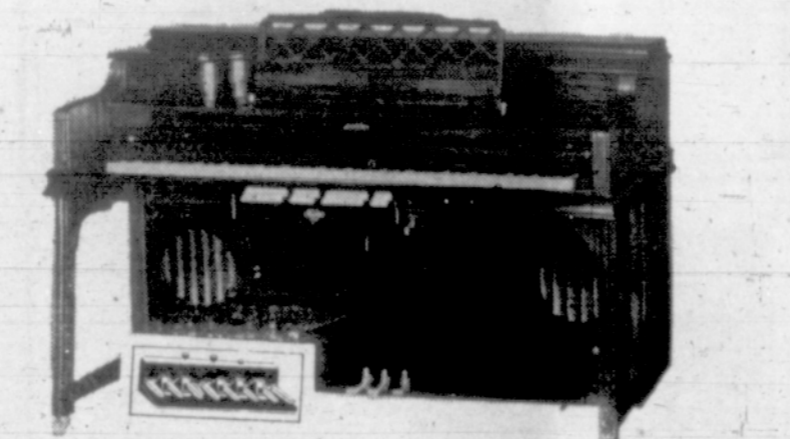
