HISTORICAL SOCIETY
Young people are traditional-
ly more concerned with mak-
ing history than reading about
it. By the time they find out
that the rules for making his-
tory have been written long
ago, and become readers of
history, they are no longer
young.

History is interesting to all
people of all ages, whether it
is the written word, sometimes
dry and formal, or the spoken
recollection of old games, old
trips, old adventures.
Sherman county has an interest-
ing history. It is different
than the history of similar
wheat growing counties to the
extent that it is surrounded
by rivers that made it isolated
in early days and that the route
to the gold fields of the John
Day ran through it. It shared
the experience of a few counties
in being traversed by a military
road.

In settlement and in citizen-
ry Sherman county is similar
to its neighboring counties.
Some counties had partial set-
tlement by the Irish and
Scotch, some by Swedes, ours
by Germans. The majority was
always of mixed ancestry and
geographical origin. It is prob-
able that the country itself had
more to do with its character
than the population.

Those who study physics and
chemistry and the social sci-
ences are concerned with how
things got that way, what ele-
ments cause what reactions,
what racial admixtures and
geographical characteristics pro-
duce such people. History is a
lesson in that very problem.

Why Sherman countians are
like they are is a question, the
answer to which is in its his-
tory; why our boys play foot-
ball instead of lacrosse, why we
have community picnics instead
of family picnics, why we are
the kind of people we are can
all be found in our history, the
county's geography, the econ-
omic backgrounds and other
factors.

If one knew all that back-
ground he could foretell the
future for the future will, with
rare exception, follow the trends
already made—the trends that
may be found in history.
So it is odd—and unfortun-
ate—that the young so often
scorn history and that the old
read it not to plat their future
(for they have none) but to find
their mistakes.

TRUCK STRIKES
Strikes ordinarily are not a
source of amusement. But the
truck strike will certainly bring
a hearty laugh to watchers of
the public scene. There are lots
of laughs in it anyway.

From here it looks like this:
The big truck men fought the
legislative bill that would in-
crease the percentage of high-
way revenue the trucks pay
from 28 to 33 percent. The bill
called for payment on the ba-
sis of weight. The legislature
passed it by a strong vote and
is entitled to an award for
proper functioning thereby.

Then the big truckers initi-
ated against the law and suc-
ceeded in holding up its enforce-
ment until after November,
1952. They are also trying to
pass a constitutional amend-
ment to prevent classification
of highway vehicles by weight,
an effort that indicates supreme
arrogance.

Recently Dave Beck, big
teamster boss of Seattle and a
big wheel in the AFL of the
nation, came to Portland and
the teamsters pledged their aid
to the bill and constitutional
amendment. Dave Beck's visits
to Oregon have been very, very
rare since the "goon" days, in-
cidentally.

Now the truck drivers (team-
sters union) is going on strike
against the very truck com-
panies they so recently promised
to support in the coming vote
battle.

Mr. Beck has a reputation of
working with the bosses as well
as with the men. It does look
to a man upon a hill as if the
trucking companies are going
to have to pay for the support of
the drivers. It isn't blackmail;
it's politics.
And if you want to laugh, go
ahead.
