Miss Vivian Trounce left recently for an indefinite visit in California. She expects to visit Mrs. Burton Paine at San Francisco, also relatives in Los An-

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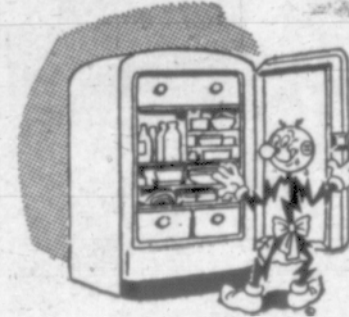
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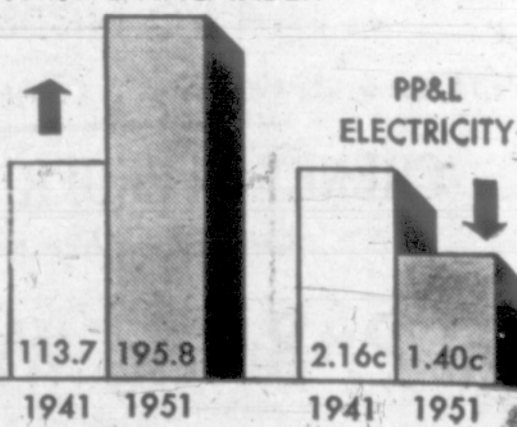
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
