est. It is much smaller and ex-

**FAT**

One day when we were away  
from home we saw a woman  
whose build indicated the pos-  
session of an active appetite.  
And we wondered, as we have  
before when confronted with men

many pounds of food it takes

On beef cattle and swine and  
even sheep which are grown for

be done with four and every  
4-H beef club member can give  
similar figures for beef. Man  
gets plenty of proteins and such

Some worry about it; some  
glory in it. Some persons seem  
to have around 150 pounds more  
than they need which would in-  
dicate the consumption of around  
600 pounds more food than ne-  
cessary. Our estimate is that  
such a quantity of food would be  
worth at least \$300. If one wishes  
to display his wealth from every  
limb, from every fold and chin,  
it can be done rather cheaply.  
A Cadillac cost much more.

Therefore we may look upon  
the obese as those who seek to  
give evidence of prosperity; ad-  
vocates of the simplest use of  
the Veblen term; conspicuous  
consumption.

**HIGH INTEREST**

The government is finding  
that the law of supply and de-  
mand is still in force in spite of  
long and hard attempts to repeal  
it. It is proving effective in the  
money market.

The government has been able  
to service its 263 billion dollar  
debt for less than four million  
dollars even with the "E" bonds  
that bear almost three percent  
interest. But those days are  
gone. Inflation, mostly govern-  
ment engendered, has finally  
raised the cost of money along  
with everything else. Investors  
can get more for their money,  
derived from big wages and pro-  
fits, than by loaning to the gov-  
ernment.

So the government is raising  
interest rates to meet the need  
for new money and to permit  
payment of war time bonds now  
coming due. It is a penalty for  
making no effort to reduce the  
debt.

Many persons have refused to  
buy government bonds because  
the government was making no  
effort to reduce expenses. They  
felt that the only way to  
achieve any sort of economy  
was to reduce the amount of  
money the government got abroad  
of. Actually the government pro-  
duces money at will. Were taxes  
cut to meet actual need and a  
surtax put on strictly for debt  
reduction it might solve a serious  
problem.

**WHAT TO DO; WHAT TO DO?**

It is amusing these days to  
watch news reports of the strug-  
gle going on within the Demo-  
cratic party. Stevenson acts as  
if he would like to strike out on  
his own and disclaim support  
from the Truman element in his  
party. Yet, he doesn't dare get  
too far afield, for to do so would  
lose him the support of the nor-  
thern "liberals" while strength-  
ening his claim on the south  
which is not so solid as once it  
was.

There are millions of office  
holders who would work for  
Stevenson if assured that he  
would continue them in office  
and certainly there are millions  
of citizens who would vote for  
him if they thought he would re-  
move many of them—particularly  
those with no ability to dis-  
tinguish their money from the  
government's.

As a man Stevenson will  
sleep better if he disclaims any  
connection with Truman and his  
lik, even though the record is

in getting the nomination. As a  
candidate and as a president (if  
he is elected) he will have to go
