Evan Ellis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lin Ellis, is recovering from an injured hand obtained as he slid down a mountainside while climbing.

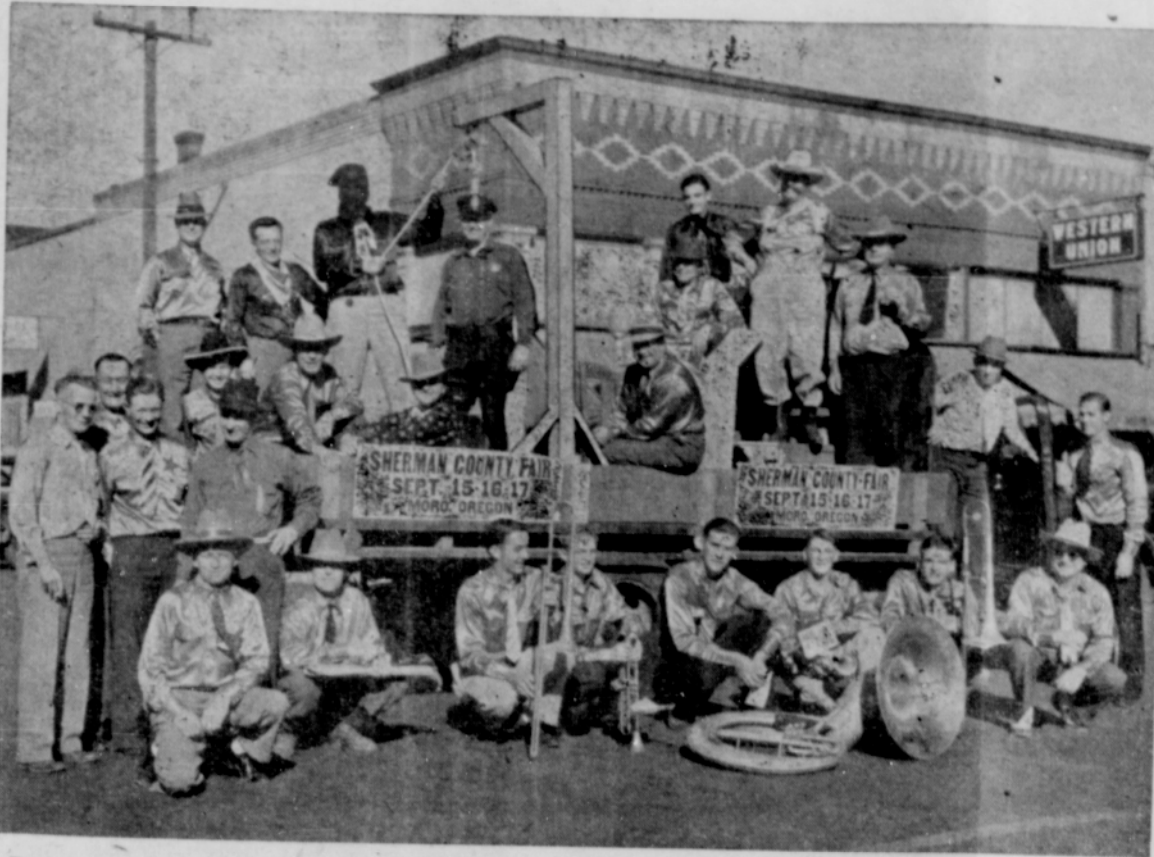

SEED LIFE VARIES
Will vegetable seeds left over from planting the garden this year be any good next spring?

Ralph Clark, extension horticultural specialist at OSC, says the length of life of seeds depends mainly on two things—kind of seed and the conditions under which the seeds are stored.

Different kinds of seed vary greatly in their length of life. Onion, sweet corn, parsley and parsnip seeds keep their vitality for only one or two years; beans, peas, okra and salsify for two to three years; cabbage, collards, kale, turnips and mustard, four

Ordinarily it is best to buy seeds fresh each year, Clark emphasizes. But if seeds are held over until next year, by all means make a germination test before planting them, he says.

All of these times assume storage under favorable conditions—a cool temperature and fairly low humidity. Seeds do not keep their vitality as long in hot, hu-
