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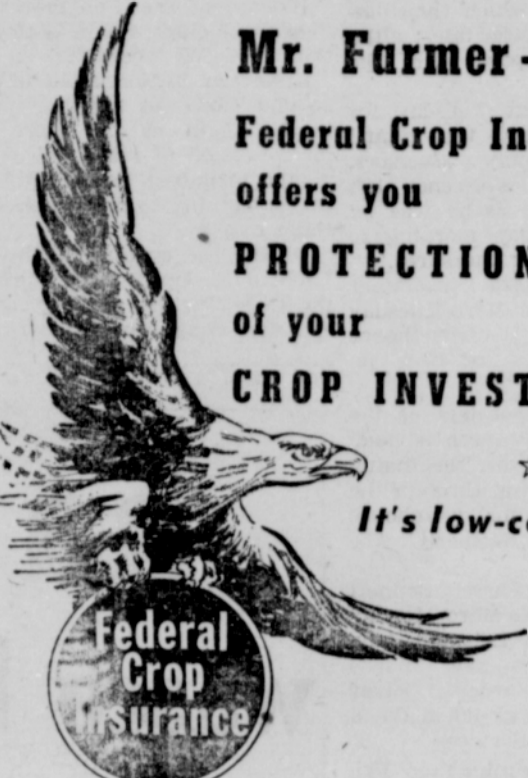
LOST: Four head yearling Registered Hereford heifer-erson John Day river. Disappeared early in June.

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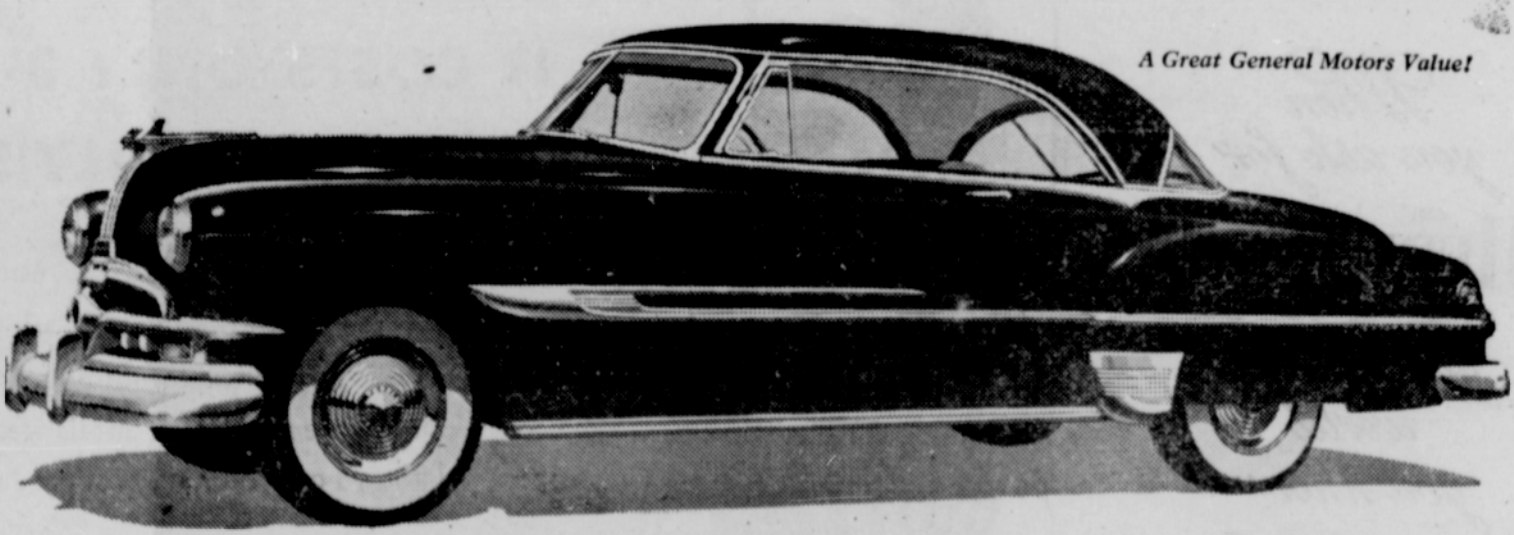
