THE ISSUES

Sometimes it seems that the name calling in a campaign is actually designed to cover up the real issues involved. At any rate if the name calling is sufficiently intense, sufficiently original and occasionally amusing it pushes the issues into the background until they are forgotten until after election. Then it is too late.

The major issue of this presidential campaign is the dishonesty of this administration and the extreme danger of its possible approval by the voters if it is even temporarily forgotten.

Of late the matter of peace and the solution of the war in Korea has come to the front perhaps because of more extensive fighting for the dominant hills of central Korea. If we are going to have war it is necessary that we have a president who understands war and looks upon it as a military weapon, not as a political weapon. Wars started for political reasons are the continuing kind, apparently, that are not to be settled by military might.

We are going to need some cooperation in this country for the next four years, going to need a president who does not antagonize those with whom he disagrees on some point. Eisenhower has made a reputation on that score. Southern states may or may not vote for him, but he will be able to get along with southern senators. That is more than Truman has been able to do and there has been no important legislation for four years for that reason.

As for foreign policy much is being made by the new dealers

**Change Made In SCS Organization**

Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan announced today the realignment of USDA responsibilities in the fields of soil surveys and soil, crop and water management research. Responsibility to conduct the National Cooperative Soil Survey, which has been the responsibility of the Agricultural Research Administration, has been assigned to the Soil Conservation Service, and responsibility for all research in soil and crop management and in water management on farms related to crop production has been assigned to the ARA, including that previously carried on by the SCS.

This realignment of responsibilities will be effective as of November 15, 1952. The purpose of this action is to consolidate into one operation the soil survey work of the ARA and the conservation survey work of the SCS, and to focus more sharply all resources for soil, crop and water management research on the various problems that confront farmers throughout the country.

Both lines of work are conducted cooperatively with state agricultural experiment stations. The secretary explained that the action is being taken after consultation with and approval of the Experiment Station Committee on Organization and Policy of the Association of Land Grant colleges & universities, and after discussion with other associations and groups interested in soil and water conservation and management, such as the National association of Soil Conser-
