Mrs. W. R. Reid and Mrs. Ora Workman spent several days in Portland last week on business and visiting the Workman's daughter, Janet.

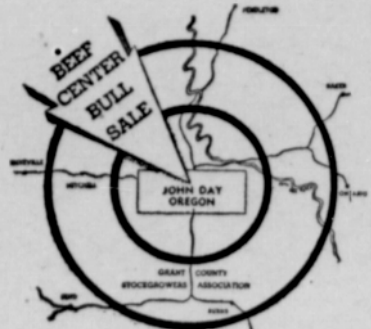

Sign Shows Street

The Sherman county branch of the First National Bank of Portland has become a beacon along highway 97 since its huge new "1st" sign began operating a week ago on the new bank building.

and is five feet nine inches wide, weighing over 2,000 lbs. A 12-inch heavy duty steel pole is sunken seven feet into the earth to hold up the flashing sign.



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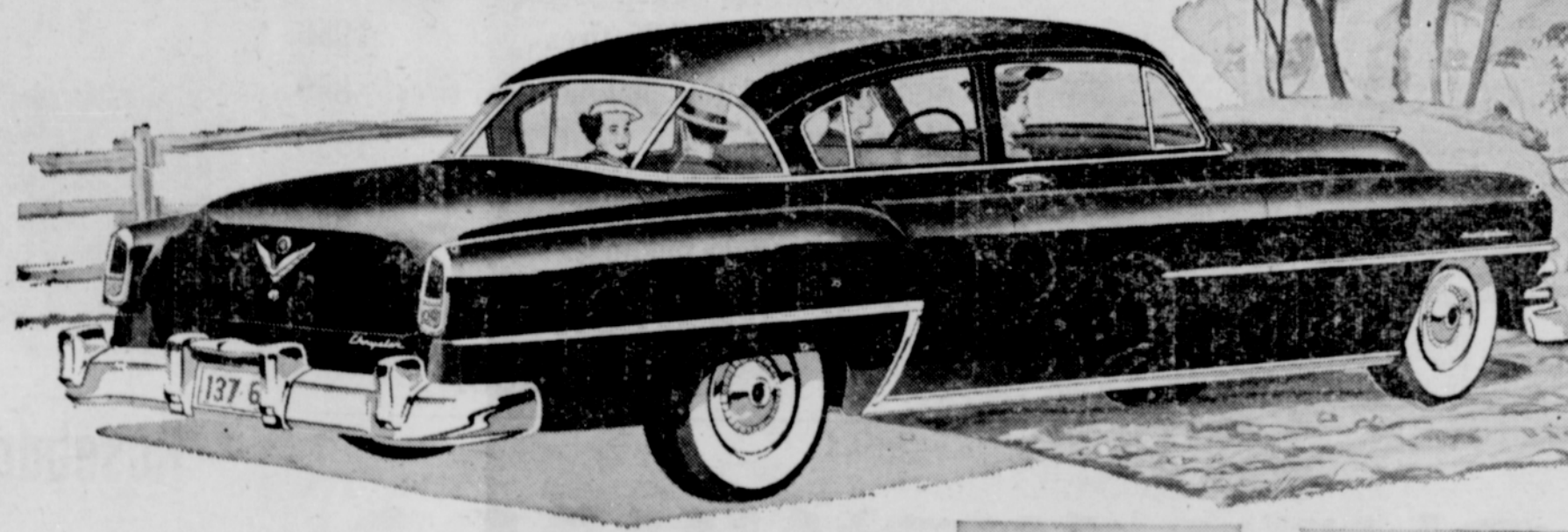
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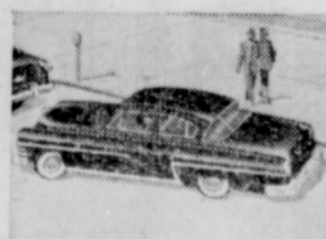
