von Borstel. He brought his movie projector and showed Portland and spent a few days attending the annual meeting of the Cancer society.

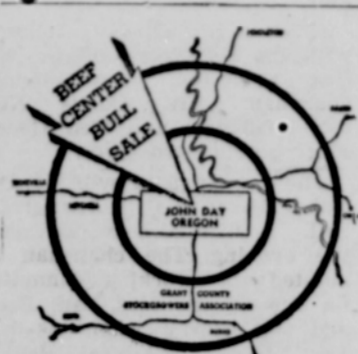
