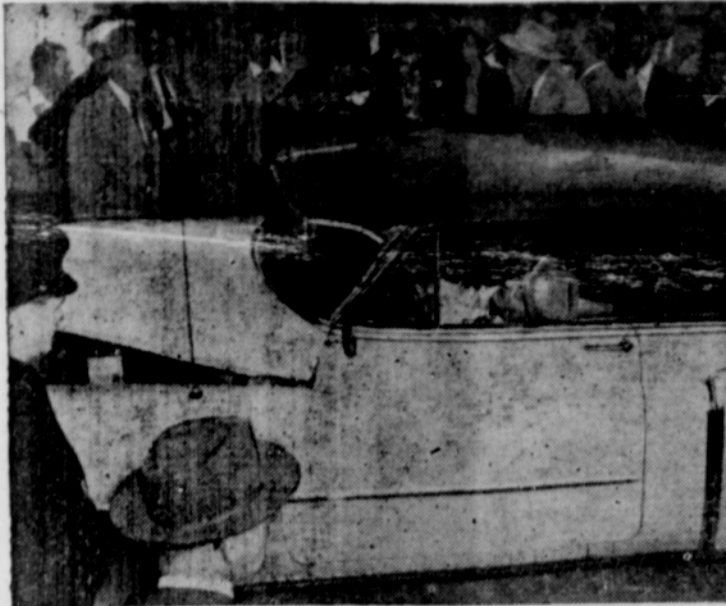

TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS COST 276 LICENSES

Traffic violation convictions totalling 3,351 were reported to the secretary of state's office in November, the office reported Friday.

Serious traffic offences—driving while under the influence, reckless driving, and violation of the basic rule—resulted in 276 driver license suspensions during the month.

Leading the list, as usual, was driving while intoxicated which accounted for 211 suspensions. Other licenses were lifted from traffic miscreants for passing with insufficient clearance, failure to yield right of way, racing on the highway, disre-

garding a signal and driving on the wrong side of the street.

Records of all violation convictions are kept on individual driver folders, and if a driver accumulates too many convictions or accidents in a 12-month period he faces the possibility of license suspension because of poor driving record. Four such drivers had licenses suspended in November, he added.

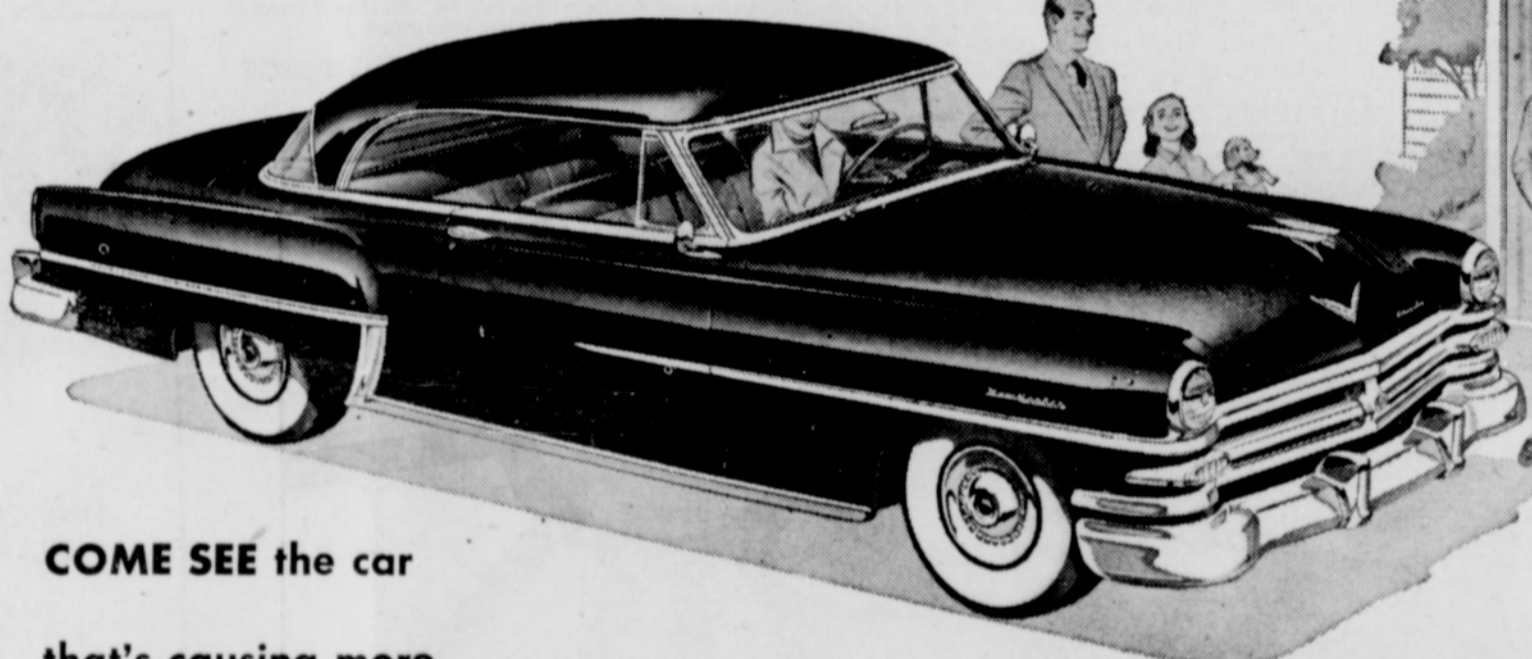

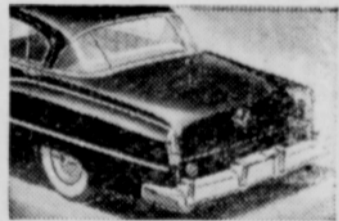
