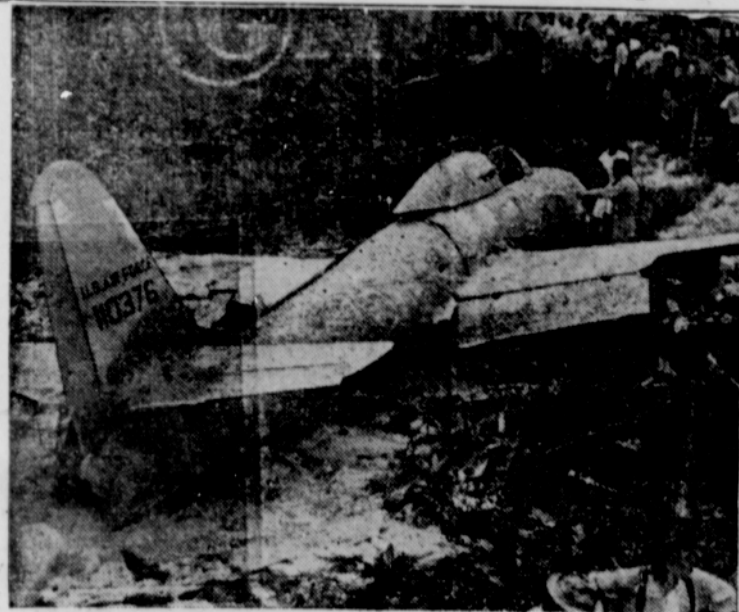

The temperature took a dip, Saturday and Sunday making traveling very fast hazardous on account of ice in places.

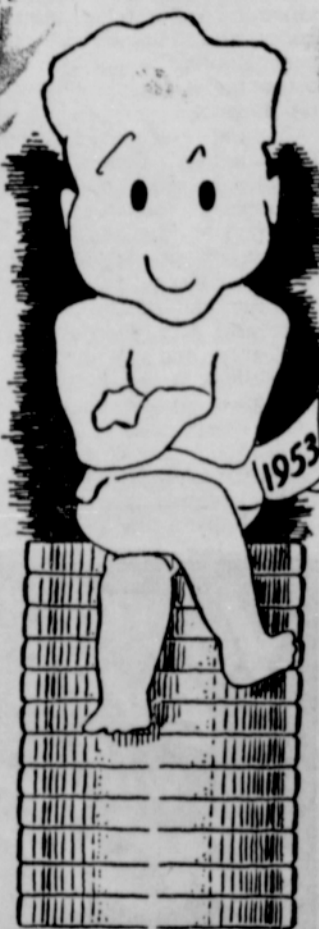

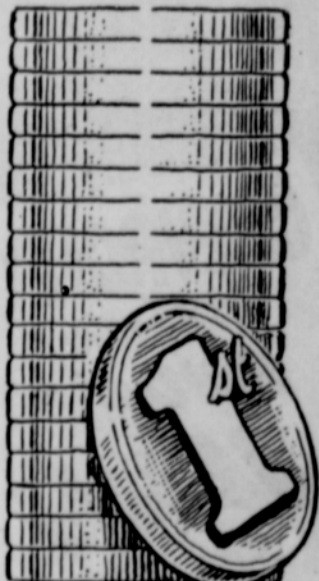
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
