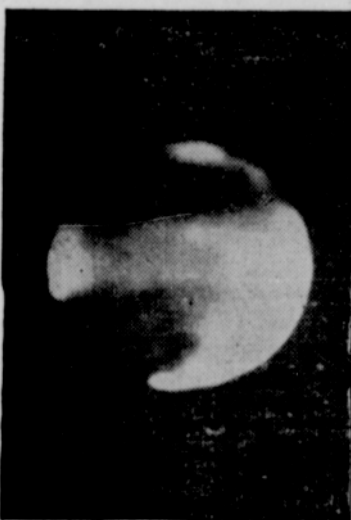
Harry Kunsman returned home Sunday after several days spent in Portland parting with his teeth in preparation for some store choppers.

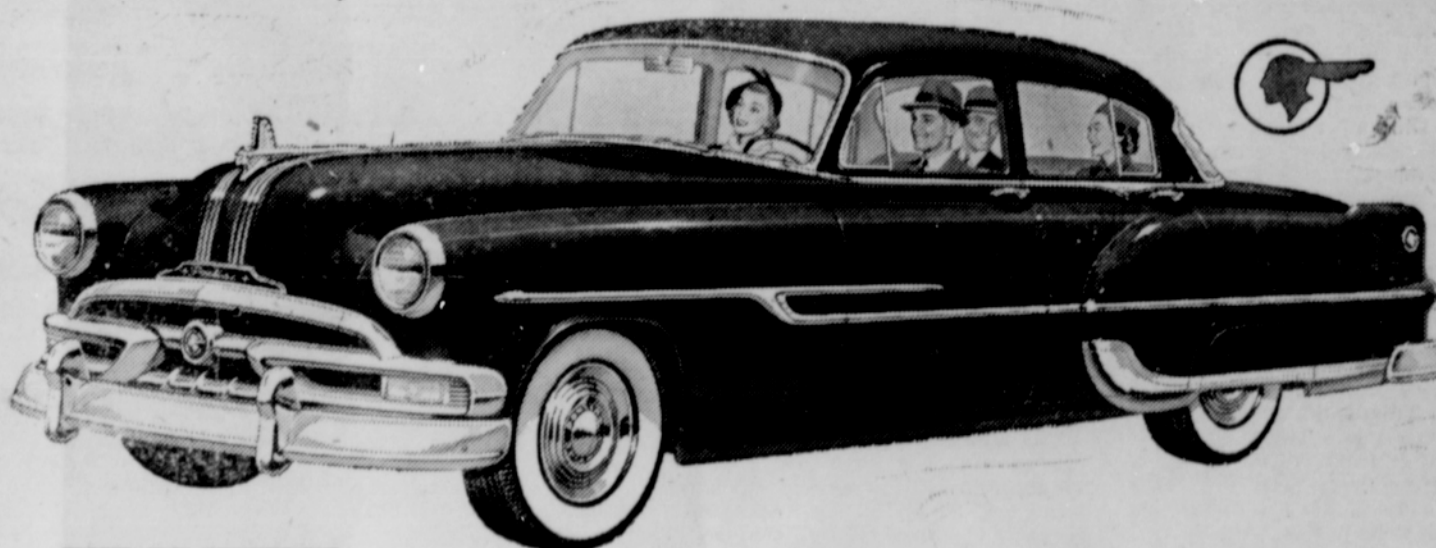
