COUNTY RAMBLIN'S

Joe Peters, Tex Irzyk, and Jim Tate have obtained moisture and nitrate determinations through the Pendleton Grain Growers' relative to application of nitrogen fertilizers. Samples are being taken by personnel from the Interstate Tractor and Equipment company and forwarded to Pendleton for analysis. The Knettle Farm Management Service, Walla, Walla, also has indicated it is available for similar tests.

Hilderbrand Brothers and W. L. Blau had samples run last fall. Peters and Irzyk had samples taken on stubble ground while Tate's samples were on wheat ground. George Schneider of Interstate Tractor company says that the two stubble fields were of good moisture to three feet and enough moisture into the sixth foot to take samples.

Quite a question exists for farmers in the northern part of the county—whether natural or nitrogen fertilizers last fall have leached away from the wheat roots due to heavy January rains. Results of the 1950 crop when low yields were obtained in this area would indicate nitrate tests are desirable and worthy of the cost.

George Mitchell and the county agent plan on sampling for three farmers this week to get a picture of the nitrate placements. Analysis will be made at the station by Mr. Mitchell. This general information will be available the first of the week.

Sherman county farmers desiring to pick up dairy stock of good breeding can do so through the Tillamook County Dairy Improvement association. Calves from ten days to two weeks old are sold at superior quality for \$39.75 and standard quality \$27.75. Breeds available are Jerseys, Guernseys, and Holsteins. Any folks interested should contact this office for further information.

Airplane applicators and commercial dealers of chemical weed materials have been invited to attend a meeting, hursday morning, February 26. Purpose of the meeting is to discuss rates, timing, and materials and consolidate information for this year's spraying program. An afternoon farmers' subject matter meeting has been scheduled for this date.

Wesley Nichols, Moro, reports excellent results from the grass waterway seeds last year on his farm. He worked in a good draw prior to plowing and seeded it down to Pubescent Wheatgrass.

The main channel where the waterway had been established did not cut while side ditches were rather serious.

He has purchased some more Pubescent Wheatgrass and plans to establish more sod waterways this spring.

Pubescent Wheatgrass is a sod

forming grass and most desirable for use in sod waterways. Several farmers in Wasco county have seed for sale. Contacts can be made through E. M. Nelson, county agent, The Dalles, for seed available. Richelderfer Ranch has sixteen acres of seed production and will produce a crop of seed this year.

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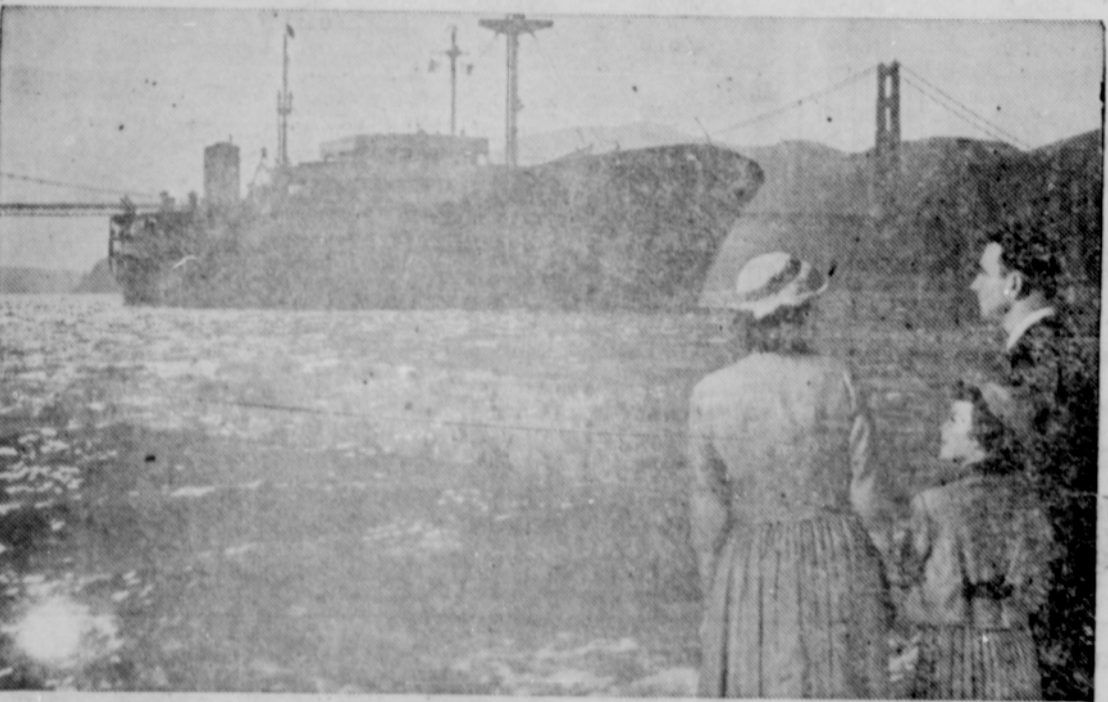
