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WHAT HENRY LUCE SAID

Henry R. Luce is the publisher of Time, Life and Fortune. Some 30 years ago he started Time with the idea that there should be a publication that would inform Americans about the world, their government and themselves and do it briefly and understandably. Because that publication has been a success in that it has proven the value of the original idea and because it has made a lot of money, the opinions of Mr. Luce are considered important in the publishing world.

Mr. Luce gave the Eric Allen lecture last Friday to the Oregon Press conference at Eugene and to students of journalism at the university.

He said that a newspaper's duty is to inform its readers about public affairs. That seems simple enough and is a statement to which there is general agreement. Elaborated it becomes more complex.

Without background a statement about public affairs is often useless. For instance, a man is running for county judge. The duty of a newspaper, according to Mr. Luce, is to inform the readers of the man, not merely his birthdate, his offspring, his educational attainments, but his attitudes toward government (does he believe in government assuming all duties it can or leaving them to the people, his background in business and public affairs. It might also interpret the duties of the office to show how the candidate or candidates might fit into that office.

For local offices the newspaper's information would be less valuable than for higher offices. On measures, such as we vote on in Oregon, it is doubly important.

Oregon has good newspapers whether judged alone or in comparison to those of other states. Yet, often they recommend with scant analysis of the problem or candidate.

If followed, the Luce policy would cause newspapers to obtain and disseminate more information about public affairs. Their editors would have to study government more closely because government is all public affairs—or should be. There are other kinds of public affairs, clubs, churches, organizations of all the kind that over-organized Americans can produce.

Of course, any information should be given in the interest of the public, not the candidate or measure.

No such affluence as has accrued to Time is inherent in a newspaper that follows the Luce theory but it is likely that such information would bring a newspaper added respect and added value. Government by the people cannot be a success without some agency to inform the people of public affairs. It is a newspaper's job.

Dear Mr. Editor:

I believe it should be brought to the attention of the citizens of Moro, that the city council is contemplating angle parking on Main street. I have heard both pro and con arguments on the subject since it was considered at the last council meeting. It is a matter which should be discussed thoroughly. Many points are made as to the danger of backing out into traffic from the angle. It must be recognized there is danger in our present system with its double parking.

Some people feel that angle parking will not eliminate the problem of double parking. Generally that is the purpose of angle parking; to allow more cars to park in a given area and by making parking easier.
