Need A Rock Crusher; Government Has One

If you have need for a gravel crushing plant, a log washer, three apartment buildings, a 100 foot long wooden bridge, three frame storage buildings and other miscellaneous structures, the Army Engineers would like to sell them to you.

Colonel Thomas H. Lipscomb, Portland district engineer, has announced that bids will be opened in his office, 628 Pittcock Block, Portland, at 1 p. m. April 1, and that at that time 13 buildings and improvements at Dexter Reregulating Dam and Lookout Point Reservoir projects, about 25 miles southeast of Eugene, will be sold to the highest bidders.

At Dexter Dam there is one frame office building; one frame shop; three frame storage buildings; one log washer, motor and reduction gear; one 10 cubic yard hopper; timber bunkers and timber frame of a conveyor belt; one gravel crushing plant and equipment complete with a production capacity of from 50 to 60 cubic yards per hour.

Green Grocers Need New License

Produce dealers operating in Oregon are reminded that their annual license must be renewed by April 1 if they expect to do business after that date. This applies both to those holding wholesale or produce peddler licenses.

The state department of agriculture is mailing application forms to all licensees of record. Firms or individuals just entering the business should request the form from the department at Salem or its branch office at 372 State Office Building Portland. The department points out that the metal license plate accompanying the license must be displayed at the rear of the vehicle and must be visible at all times.
