E. L. Fagan and Clair A. Penners have been named assistant managers at The Dalles branch of the United States National bank. Announcement of their appointment was made by E. C. Sammons, president.

Both men are natives of The Dalles and have been with the U. S. National for more than 15 years.

Fagan joined the U. S. National in June, 1937. He has filled positions as bookkeeper, teller, note teller and as assistant in the consumer credit department.

He is a member of The Dalles chamber of commerce, Wasco county Community Chest, Kiwanis club, Elks lodge No. 303, The Dalles council Boy Scouts of America and The Dalles council Knights of Columbus.

In addition, Fagan is a member of the American Institute of Banking and has completed extension courses from the AIB and the University of Washington.

Fagan served four years with U. S. Navy during World War II and was discharged as a chief storekeeper.

BARLEY, WHEAT MARKETS SHOW MOST PROMISE, OSC ECONOMIST REPORTS

The market outlook for Oregon's 1953 barley crop is being bolstered by prospects for the smallest national supply in nearly 20 years, says M. D. Thomas, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college.

Barley and wheat rank as the most promising spring-planted field crops, the economist points out in the latest "Oregon Agricultural Situation and Outlook."

Nation-wide, the carry-over of barley is less than last year and farmers are planning to plant no more barley than the small 1952 acreage. Corn and oats show no signs of increasing the competition with barley.

Another large wheat acreage is expected but support prices keep this crop in a favorite spot for many farms. The 1953 support level is set at one cent a bushel higher than last year, and barley is up two cents over the 1952 support price.

Hay requirements for Oregon's livestock numbers will be large but lower hay prices are likely this year, Thomas believes. Even so, he says, returns from hay will probably compare favorably with other uses of the same land on many Oregon farms.

Pastures look promising as one of the cheapest sources of livestock feed. Plantings of tall (alta) fescue, ladino clover, and other forage seeds may make better returns as pasture and silage for a few years than in any other way, the economist reports. He adds that Oregon growers of most hay pasture and range seeds face an other season of high costs, heavy competition, and large carry-overs with no price support program for the first time in several years.

Hardest hit by the removal of price props will be ladino clover. Tall fescue, alsike clover, red clover, and alfalfa seeds also face lower prices until production is reduced to meet market outlets. All sold at support prices last year and supplies are large.

Chewings and creeping red fescues and Kenland red clover show the most promise among spring-planted seed crops.

CROP RECOMMENDATIONS MADE IN OSC BULLETIN

Recommendations are made for the crop varieties best adapted to each of Oregon's crop regions in a new bulletin released by the Oregon State college experiment station. The varieties recommended have been tested by the farm crop staff at OSC and by the branch experiment stations.

The bulletin covers the major varieties of the cereal crops, flax, and forage and seed crops.

To simplify the crop-variety recommendations, the state is divided into seven distinct crop regions or zones in the bulletin. The divisions are Coast, Willamette Valley, southern Oregon, Columbia basin, Blue mountain, central Oregon, and the Snake river valley.

The publication explains that within each of the crop zones there may be enough variation in other conditions, such as soil types or fertility, to modify the general recommendations. Soil moisture and type or extremes of acidity or alkalinity and also irrigation may often cause modification of the crop recommendations.
