Beeson was born in Fossil and has lived in Eugene, Portland and La Grande. He received his undergraduate education at the University of Oregon majoring in economics and journalism.

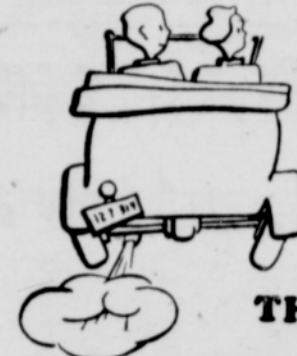
The primary room at Rufus enjoyed their picnic at Uncle Walt's Park near The Dalles Thursday, a number of the mothers went with their children.

Soil Tour Set For June 11

Permanent sod waterways, trashy fallow, grass seedings, dam practices will be shown during a tour starting at 1:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 11. The tour, construction, and other farming sponsored by the Sherman County Soil Conservation district and the county agent, will start at the Wesley Nichols ranch, east of Moro.

Sod waterways, using jubescent wheat grass, established in 1952 and 1953 will be shown on the Nichols ranch. Nomad alfalfa, a creeping type, being tried for dry land pasture, will be seen on the Max Brown farm. This alfalfa was planted in 194 and shows extensive creeping under pasture field and roadside seedings of Sherman Bluegrass on the Lester Barnum farm will be observed.

A demonstration of the skew-treader or off-set rotary hoe for control of cheat grass and volunteer will be seen on the Bill Todd ranch. Mr. Todd has trashy fallow prepared by Graham-Hoeme plan and recropping to inspect. The erosion and irrigation dams construction by the John Beuther will be observed as well as pasture on the Wallace May place.

Howard Cushman of the soil conservation service, George Mitchell of the station and Tom Helseth of SCS will go along.
