Erosion Comes In Many Ways

Overland flow is not the only factor of water caused erosion. Under certain conditions ground water can cause much damage.

In an area of deep light textured soils, large amounts of underground water underlain by an impervious layer will be the ideal set-up. The water from the water table will seek a lower point of escape and where this is edged by a canyon or hill where the impervious layer comes to the edge, water will seep out carrying with it amounts of the light soil. The absence of this soil may form caverns which in turn will cause the soil above to sluff away. In one wet season this type of erosion can take 10 or 12 acres of cultivated land out in one place in one year.

Wind erosion also takes its toll. It is needless to mention the dust storm of the mid-west that drove thousands of people from their farms and ruined thousands of acres. This type erosion can cause damage in two different ways, through blowing the soil away and by depositing of sand on top of the soil.

Samples Saved

The nearly 30 million acres of Oregon forests have been reduced to a dozen file drawers filled with wood samples at the Oregon State college school of forestry. Samples of everyone of Oregon's 183 species of woody plants—including trees and shrubs—are found among the polished

blocks of native woods gathered over the years. It is one of the best collections of native state woods in existence.

Also included in the collection are about 1100 samples of woods from other regions of the U. S., Canada, Mexico and a half dozen foreign countries. W. I. West, head of the department of forest products, is in charge.
