Sherman County Club Children Going To Summer School

Oregon State college, Corvallis, will be host to 1953 4-H Summer School, June 16 to 26, County Agent, T. W. Thompson, reports. Nearly 2000 boys and girls from every corner of the state participate in this annual ten day educational and entertaining experience.

Four-H club members attend on the basis of scholarships presented by interested individuals, business and community organizations. Delegates are selected by past year's accomplishments and by application. Thompson indicates business or community groups or individuals interested in presenting scholarships may contact one of the 4-H leaders or the county agent's office.

Boys and girls travel by school bus to Corvallis and are housed in college dormitories or fraternity or sorority houses. Classes are conducted by college personnel during the morning hours with organized recreation in the afternoon. Thompson indicates boys and girls get an insight to college activities and gain a great experience in meeting and learning about other parts of the state. Club members are introduced to subjects varying from personal grooming, livestock production, management and improvement, varied home economics subjects for girls, and entertainment.

Voters Think Law Should Limit Speed

In an opinion poll of a cross section of 2000 of its members the Oregon State Motor association has learned that 67 per cent are in favor of Oregon having a fixed speed limit on the open highway while 33 per cent felt a fixed speed would not decrease accidents. The majority thought 60 miles an hour should be the limit on the open highway.
