No More Liquor

Outlets Says O.L.C.C.

Despite issuance of 466 liquor-by-the-drink licenses during May, the number of retail premises where alcoholic beverages may be purchased remains almost stable with less than one percent increase, the Oregon liquor control commission reports. Although there are 28 more retail outlets since dispenser licensing began, there is a drop of 42 tavern, six restaurants and 48 package beer licenses. The fact that some premises have more than one license also controls the number of outlets.

At May 31 there were 5589 retail licenses issued to 4609 premises.

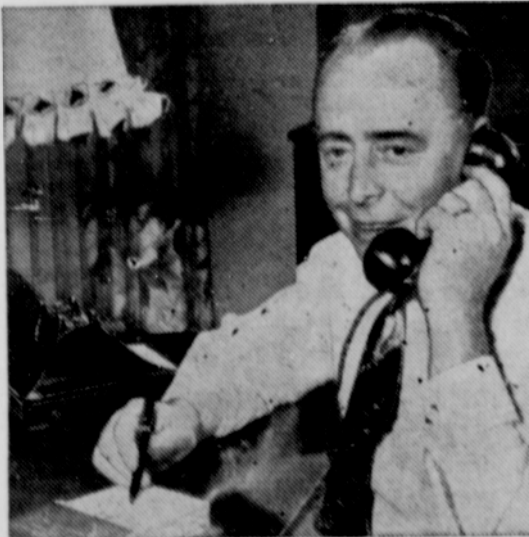

363 restaurant licenses, 1957 tavern licenses, 153 private club licenses (which showed no change during May), and 466 dispenser licenses. There are 76 master locker privileges issued to private clubs.
