Northwest Has More Wheat Than Ever Before

In the Pacific Northwest there are more acres seeded to wheat than at any time in history. In Washington, Oregon and Idaho there are 5,995,000 acres in wheat according to the December 1952 estimate of the department of agriculture. This is 170,000 more than last year and is part of tendency to grow more wheat evident in the central states as well. There the acreage of hard winter wheat is 34,316,000 acres.

Stockyard Price Figures

Given Out Here

Fred Rubie of the Portland stockyards, who accompanied the cattle tour through Sherman county, had some figures compiled by the office about stock prices at Portland since 1910. In that 45 year period, the figures showed, the average for steers was \$12.65, for hogs \$12.92 and for lambs \$12.33. During the forty years the prices of the three kinds of meat have varied some what but average very close to each other.

Highest price paid for steers was in 1951 when they sold for \$36.24. Hogs were highest in 1947 with a price of \$27.71 and sheep were at the top in 1951 with \$32.24.

In the 1910-40 period steers averaged \$8.74 and since then the average has been \$22.76; for hogs \$10.37 and \$19.49; for lambs \$9.60 and \$19.42.

More Beef Killed In

Oregon In April

Production of dressed meat in state and federally licensed slaughter plants in Oregon during April 1953, estimated at 15.3 million pounds, was 7 per cent below the March output but was 8 per cent above the April 1952 total, the Crop Reporting service reports. The output of dressed beef and veal was equal to the March output while lamb and mutton production was down 6 per cent and pork production, 19 percent. In comparison to the same month a year ago, meat production for all species or classes was up except pork which was down 23 per cent from April 1952. Beef production was up 32 per cent, veal 22 per cent, and lamb and mutton up 11 per cent. During the first four months of 1953, beef production was up 21 per cent from the same period in 1952. Veal production was up 38 per cent and lamb and mutton production was up 8 per cent. Dressed pork production during the first four months of 1953 was 13

per cent less than during the same months in 1952.

Cattle slaughter during April, estimated at 20,000 head was down 1,000 head from March but was up 5,500 head from the April of a year ago total. Slaughter cattle averaged 924 pounds per head for the month, up 4 pounds from March but 56 pounds less than the April 1952 average. The number of hogs killed during the first four months of 1953, estimated at 157,000 head, was down 14 per cent or 25,000 head from the January-April 1952 total. The total live weight for the same comparison showed 1953 slaughter down 13 per cent.
