Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Balzer left last week for Portland to visit their son, Melvin and family, he having his vacation time from the railroad.

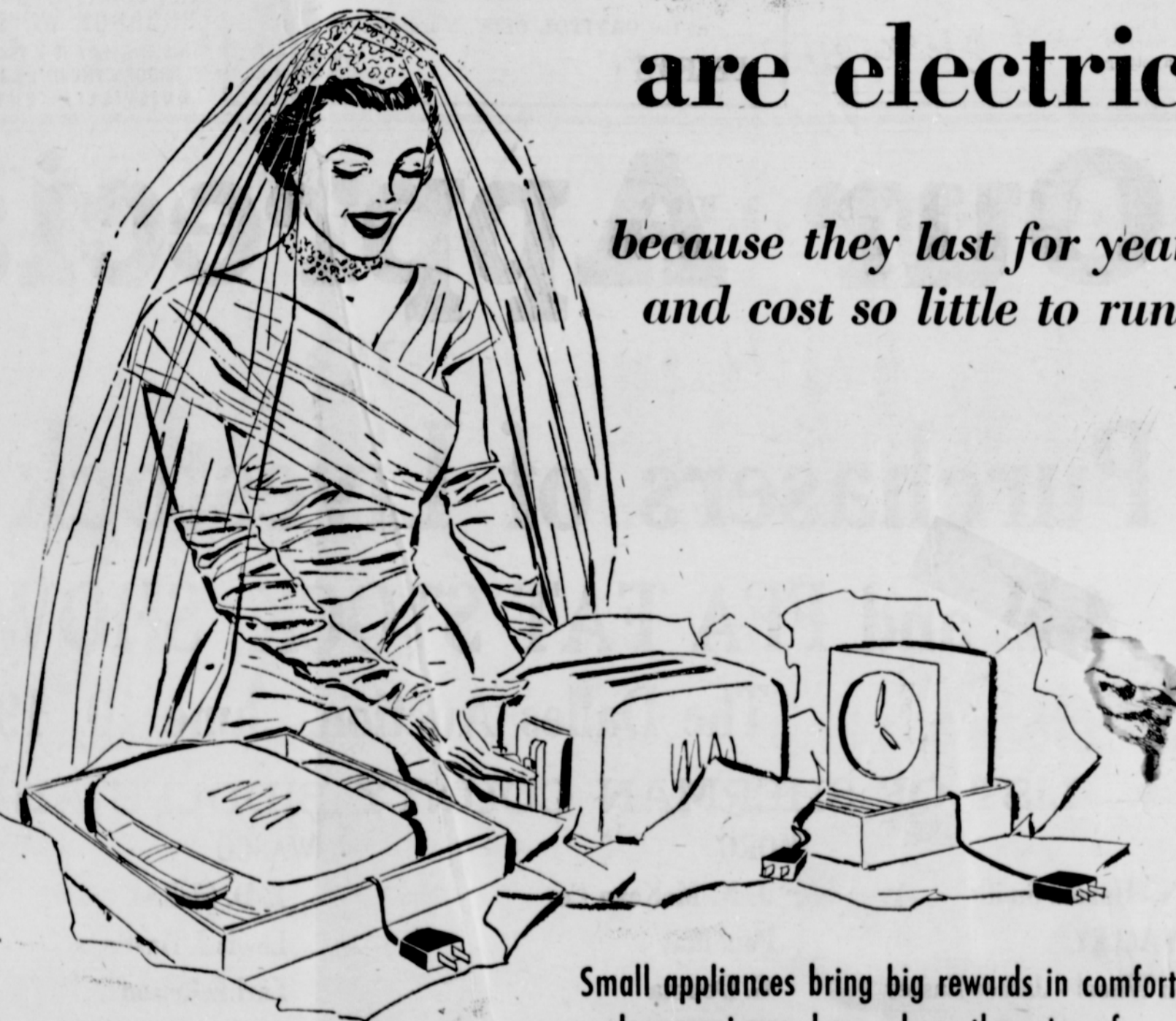
Herman Peters, long time warehouse and elevator operator for the Grass Valley Grain Growers and even before they were organized, resigned last week end.

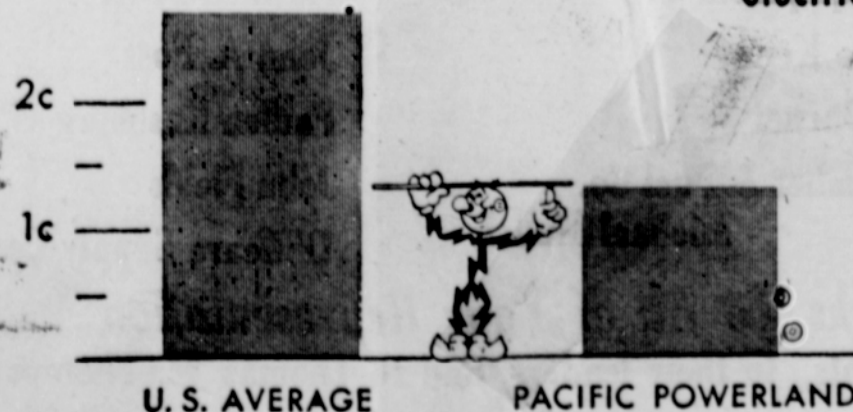
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
