County Ramblin's

We received, this week, a certificate of accreditation for tuberculosis of cattle for Sherman county. During past two months, 10% of female cattle have been tested for T. B. and reaction has been less than the 1/2 of 1% allowed under the accreditation program. The certification was issued jointly by the state department of agriculture and bureau of animal industry, USDA. Continual accreditation is necessary to allow Sherman county cattle to move in interstate sales.

Aphids on wheat are extremely heavy this year throughout the county. Infestations in past years have not been heavy enough to justify chemical control. Damage could be severe enough in some spots to cause reduced yields.

Art and Delmar Smith have indicated a good carrying capacity on their nine acres of irrigated pasture. Art says they are handling twenty beef cows and calves, a bull, two milk cows and a few steers. To date no limit has been found in increased production by using water and nitrogen fertilizer in right proportions on irrigated pastures.

Cheatgrass control plots on roadbanks adjacent to Art Smith and Lee Belshee land show excellent control. Chloro IPC and regular IPC look good at a four pound per acre rate application applied in the fall before rain or germination of the seed. The materials act on the germinated seedling allowing control of early broadleaf weeds as well as cheatgrass.

A simple back scratcher or rubber for fly control on cattle can be constructed with poles, barbed wire, and burlap sacks to give cattle relief throughout the summer months. Construction amounts to planting one pole about six feet high firmly planted with four strands of barbed wire coming from the top each way down to a dead man in the ground. The wires and pole are then thoroughly wrapped with several layers

of burlap and tied securely. Treatment of burlap can then be made using one part of 25% DDT or methoxychlor emulsion, to four parts of clean diesel oil. One gallon generally will treat a rubbing device thoroughly. The burlap should be wet but not over-soaked.

Rubbing devices can be placed by salt licks or near water tanks and dams in pastures. Cost is minor and does have benefit for house control as well as flies. Many chemical rubbing devices are on the market, but a well built home scratch seems to do a superior job. This equipment has been used in Klamath county with excellent results.

The June bulletin of the Oregon State Game Commission indicates 160 buck deer were killed in Sherman county during the 1953 deer season. Hunters report indicated 342 folks hunted for deer making a percent of hunters' success at 46.8.
