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TRouble IN RUSSIA
 The troubles in the Kremlin are showing slightly and struggle for power can be discerned in reports from Russia and stories in Russian newspapers, all of which are official newspapers. They all say what they are told to say.
 The west is doing as much speculating on it as it can with limited information and certainly some of it is right and surely much of it is wrong.
 Normally anyone would expect conflict between any three men given control of a nation. Historically triumvirates always break up and usually by the elimination of the weaker or bolder member. Beria, as head of the police, must have been in charge of suppression of rioting Germans and Poles. His success was not perfect and that may mean the end of Beria. That indicates that the Russian ideal of governing the people has not changed. The next boss of the police will put down rebellions.
 Those who find in the news from Russia evidence of a conciliatory attitude toward the west and the subjects are being overly hopeful. Beria failed to put down riots; Beria is out.
 Some persons who should be informed say that it will not be possible to suppress the people in the satellite states much longer. They are hungry and so overworked that they will not care to live under their conditions. If that is true perhaps even the toughest Russian will have to admit defeat as a suppressor of riots.
 Until the rulers of the Russian people adopt a long policy of treating their captive countries better there doesn't seem to be much hope for change, especially as long as those who may be responsible for softness are put out of office by a trial for treason.
PRISON RIOT
 It should be pleasant to Oregonians to know that the present administration at the state penitentiary is strong enough to keep

prisoners from rioting as they did in some states. Warden Gladden seems to know what to do around a penitentiary that is a relief from the ineptitude that characterized the former administration.
 Readers of the newspapers got the notion that under O'Malley lifer Dupree Poe was the real boss of the place and insiders had that opinion also. Now the complaining group led by Poe was not recognized at all by Gladden who will deal only with other prisoners. That may break the power of these who have been leaders among the convicts for some time.

 Sealed bids will be received by the undersigned until 8:00 o'clock P. M., Pacific Standard Time, on the 21st day of July, 1953, and immediately thereafter opened by the District School Board of School District No. 7, Sherman County, Oregon, at a meeting of said Board in the High School Building at Wasco, Sherman County, Oregon, for the purchase, at not less than par and accrued interest of the following described negotiable general obligation coupon bonds of said School District in the principal amount of \$95,000.00, dated August 1, 1953 in denominations of \$1000.00 each and maturing serially in numerical order as follows:

The bonds will bear interest payable semi-annually at such rate or rates, not exceeding six per cent (6%) per annum, as shall be specified by the successful bidder. Both the principal and interest of the bonds will be paid at the office of the County Treasurer of Sherman County, Oregon.
 The bonds will be sold to the bidder offering the lowest effective interest rate to the District, taking into consideration and account such premiums as are offered and such items of cost as have been or shall be charged by the bidder in connection with the purchase of the bonds. The District School Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids. Unless all bids are rejected the bonds will be awarded to the bid-

der complying with the terms of the notice of sale and submitting the bid which provides the lowest cost to the School District.

Each bid must be unconditional, must be accompanied by a certified check on a bank doing business in the State of Oregon in an amount equal to five per cent (5%) of the par value of the bonds, and must be enclosed in a sealed envelope addressed to the undersigned and marked on the outside "Bids for Bonds". No interest will be allowed on the deposit with the bid, but the check of the successful bidder will be retained as part payment of the bonds, or to secure the school district against any loss resulting from failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of his bid.

Each bidder shall include in his bid a statement of the total cost to the School District if his bid be accepted.
 These bonds are issued under and pursuant to authority conferred on the District School Board of said School District No. 7, Sherman County, Oregon, by the legal voters thereof at an election duly and legally called and held in and for said district on the 15th day of June, 1953, and are issued under the authority of Chapter 17, Title 111, O.C.L.A., as amended.

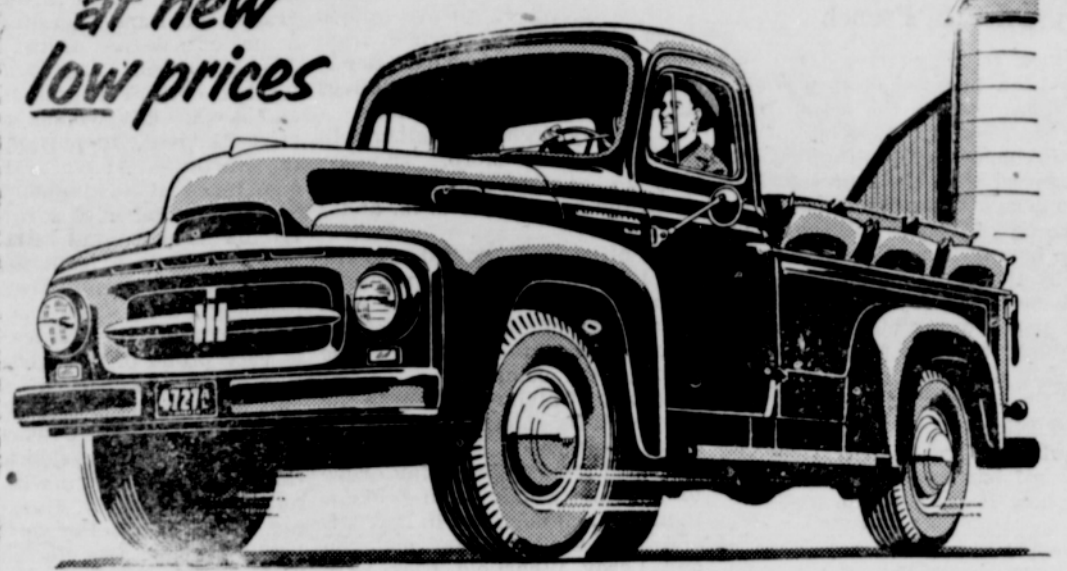
