REAPPORTIONMENT

The decision of Judge Kimmel that the recently passed constitutional amendment about reapportionment of the Oregon legislature was not entirely unexpected and it is thought certain that the case will go to the supreme court. Final decision should not be made in a lower court.

News stories about the case merely said that the judge said that any change in the constitution could not be unconstitutional. The case against the change, however, is that it does not follow the constitution in all points. That is, it does not do what its supporters said it would do and is not clear in its provisions.

The bill was passed by a decisive majority which it gained partly because of the work done for another bill at the previous election; it carried also because almost no work was done in opposition to it. Many have been found who voted for it under the assumption that they were voting for the balanced plan of 1951.

The new apportionment centers political power in a small segment of Oregon and will make it possible for the rural part of Oregon with all its potential ability for growth and development to be politically so weak as to be unable to protect itself. The agricultural and timber parts of the state cannot control legislation hereafter.

Political astuteness being equal the city can control the state. The city, in Oregon, has never shown any interest in the up-state other than financial and has consistently refused to understand up-state problems or even to study them. It is probably true in other states as well. Up-state Oregon derives its financial backing outside the state; it sells its products outside Oregon. Portland has never been a metropolis in anything but population if being a metropolis means leadership in civic, political, economic matters.

The state will suffer if the up-state cannot control its own political destiny. But then it may hasten the day when rural Oregon develops itself without the benefit of political aids although they are useful.
