CONDON BEEF FEEDING CONTEST OPEN TO SHERMAN COUNTY STOCKMEN

Cattlemen of Sherman county have an opportunity to enter stock in the Gilliam County Beef Improvement association feeding program for the 1953-54 test.

The feeding program will start the first of January and continue for 120 days. The shorter feeding period will reduce the cost to \$125 for bulls or heifers entered into the testing program. Animals will be given a 12 day warm up period and receive a ration of two-thirds hay and one-third pellets.

Sherman county cattlemen interested in entering animals in this testing program should contact the county extension agent.

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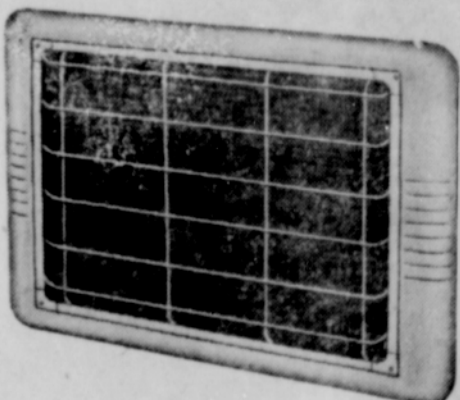
