DEMAND GOOD FOR CATTLE

Demand for cattle continued to exceed supply at the Hermiston livestock auction Friday despite an increase in consignment to 401 head compared with 359 head the previous Friday. Delbert Anson, manager of the sale, reports. Consignments at the special sale of calves and yearling steers Tuesday were 363 head; heifer calves topping the Tuesday market at \$15.30 cwt.

Weaner calves, which were up three dollars per hundredweight Friday bringing up to \$17.70 for steer calves, and yearling steers for potato feeders are in strong demand for the sale next Friday.

Cattle prices were generally stronger, \$1 to \$1.25 higher. Steers consigned Friday were of better quality and graded good. Fat heifers were up \$1.25. California, Yakima valley and local feeders were very active in buying and coastal packers were also well represented.

Oscar McCarty of Echo received the highest price this fall for Holstein steers, 18 steers weighing 18,990 pounds bringing \$12.10 cwt. Evelyn Wood of Hermiston received the highest heavy calf price this fall, \$17.70 cwt for a 625 pound animal.

Also consigned Friday were 109 hogs, compared with 132 the previous Friday, and 85 sheep compared with 538 at the semi-weekly sheep sale the previous Friday. Top hogs were down \$8.12 to \$22.10, but other hogs were steady. Fat lambs and bred ewes are in demand for the sheep sale Friday.

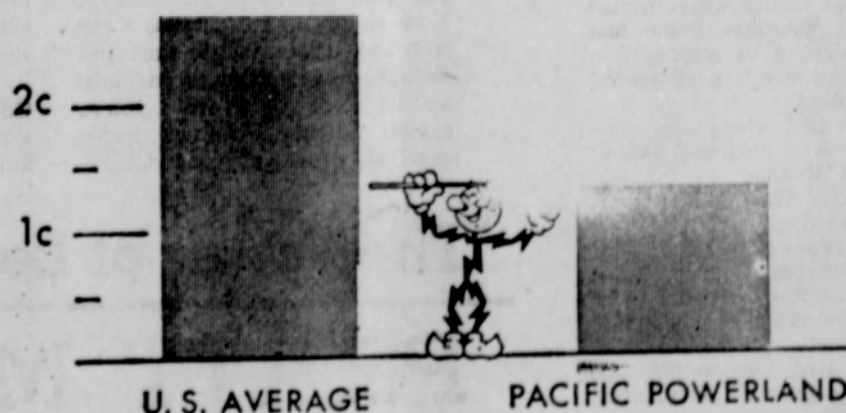
