Farm Homes To Host Visitors Need

Farm families who will open their homes to International Farm Youth Exchanges are being sought now, T. W. Thompson, county extension agent announced.

Folks under this program have appeared in Sherman county during past years.

Through the exchange about eight young visitors from other countries will spend part of the year in Oregon, he said.

A young New Zealand dairy farmer is the first one to be assigned to an Oregon visit this year. He is John Matthew Whitlock, 23, of Kairanga, New Zealand. The farm homes at which he will stay have not been selected.

The International Farm Youth Exchange gives overseas young people, 18 to 28 years of age, a chance to see how Americans live. They live, work and play with farm families.

For each delegate Oregon sends to some other country, two exchanges spend two to three months in the state. Each of these foreign visitors also goes to another state before returning home.

Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, state 4-H extension agent, heading the IFYE program in Oregon, said each exchange will probably have an opportunity to stay with two or three different farm families. By this arrangement, they will stay from four to six weeks with each family, working with them for room and board.

Thompson said additional details and application forms for those interested in providing a temporary home for a visitor may be obtained at the county extension office, Moro.

DEMONSTRATION AGENT CASE STATED

Securing a county home extension agent for 4-H and adult home economics educational work is the 1954 project for the Farm Home and Rural Life committee of the Sherman county rural advisory council, County Agent T. W. Thompson has indicated.

The committee meeting in March laid plans to visit their neighbors and community groups to measure interest in having a county home extension agent. The committee headed by Mrs. W. E. Bruckert will meet with the county budget committee in May to officially request county funds to secure a home extension agent.

Request for a home demonstration agent is based on the need of help for 4-H home economics club members and 4-H leaders and young adults. The agent would spend half time with 4-H club work assisting and training 4-H members and leaders. Work with adults has been cited by the Farm Home and Rural Life committee as clothing construction and tailoring, family budget and money management, nutrition and food preparation, programs in creative crafts and improved human relations, and other projects in the youth and home life field.

The home demonstration agent helps homemakers plan local programs to meet their needs and interests. Home extension work is geared to bring research findings to present and future homemakers, serves as a link between research developed in the Land-Grant college and U.S. Department of Agriculture and the home maker. Training for women and girls as leaders so they in turn may teach improved homemaking in their communities is part of the program.

The Farm Home and Rural Life committee is made up of representatives of the various communities over the county. Home demonstration work is one part of an education service of the national system of cooperative extension work in agriculture and home economics.

Cooperative extension work is a joint project of the United States Department of Agriculture, the state Land-Grant colleges and counties. It is financed governmentally by the federal government, the states and the counties. The county appropriates funds equal to the amount needed for local operating expenses. The state and federal government appropriates the amount of funds required for all other purposes. A county appropriation of \$3000 will be required to establish a home agent in Sherman county for 1954-55.
