County Ramblin's

Fred Dormaler, east of Wasco, has experienced considerable damage in fall and spring grain by wire worm. Paul Ritcher, head entomology department, OSC, Bill Hall and County Agent T. W. Thompson inspected damage occurring in Mr. Dormaler's field recently. The economics of wire worm control is the question unanswered for our area. Wire worms can be controlled by several materials but it is not known whether cost of control would be justified. The Oregon agricultural experiment station and extension service hope that some program can be worked out to determine the economics of wireworm control along with materials and rates of application for their control for the Columbia basin area.

The nitrogen fertilizer trial experimental plots throughout the county have shown response to the materials applied during the past couple of weeks. Plots where nitrogen was applied in the fall at 40, 60 and 80 pounds of actual nitrogen have better stands, better color, and are some what taller. The 20 pound rate is not much different than the check to date. Application of phosphorous or

sulphur do not show. Spring application generally, are not visible to date. The spring applications were applied prior to March rains and taken into the ground.

Several materials on the drug market are effective against scours in calves. Auremycin and the newer Terramycin in the oblet form can be given to infected calves. A 500 milligram auremycin oblet can be given to a calf. A half oblet or tablet should then be given following the next twenty-four hour periods. Some folks are using the vaccination method where the problem exists. Newly purchased calves or new calves in an infected herd are given a preventive bacteria shot. In all cases infected animals need be isolated from the rest of the herd.

A new variety green bean, Columbia, has been developed by agricultural pathologists at Corvallis. The bean is an improved strain of the Blue Lake type developed for eastern Oregon where curly-top varieties is a hazard on factors in production. We have been offered some trial packets of the new Columbia bean for trial in home gardens. Anyone interested in obtaining one of these 1/4 pound packets for about 75 feet of row space please let us know. We would like them planted in comparison to one other type bean for check on disease resistance and yield.
