Everybody Fishes

Over 300,000 fishing licenses were sold in Oregon during 1953 representing angler's fees of \$1,122,579, according to Lloyd Crowe, of the Oregon State Motor association. Of the total licenses, or 302,723 sold, 24,440 were non-resident, showing an increasing number traveling, mostly by automobile, to Oregon's fishing paradise.

More than 17,000,000 fishing licenses were issued last year throughout the country according

to figures supplied by the American Automobile association by the Sport Fishing Institute. California, Michigan and Wisconsin issued more than one million.

Mr. Crowe said that this high number was due in a large degree to the accessibility of streams and lakes by motor car. He said also that construction of dams and the emergence of artificial lakes have been significant in the upward trend of fishing. However, the AAA warned many streams and banks are suffering from pollution and erosion, and too frequently there is little thought and planning in proper conservation of fishing resources.

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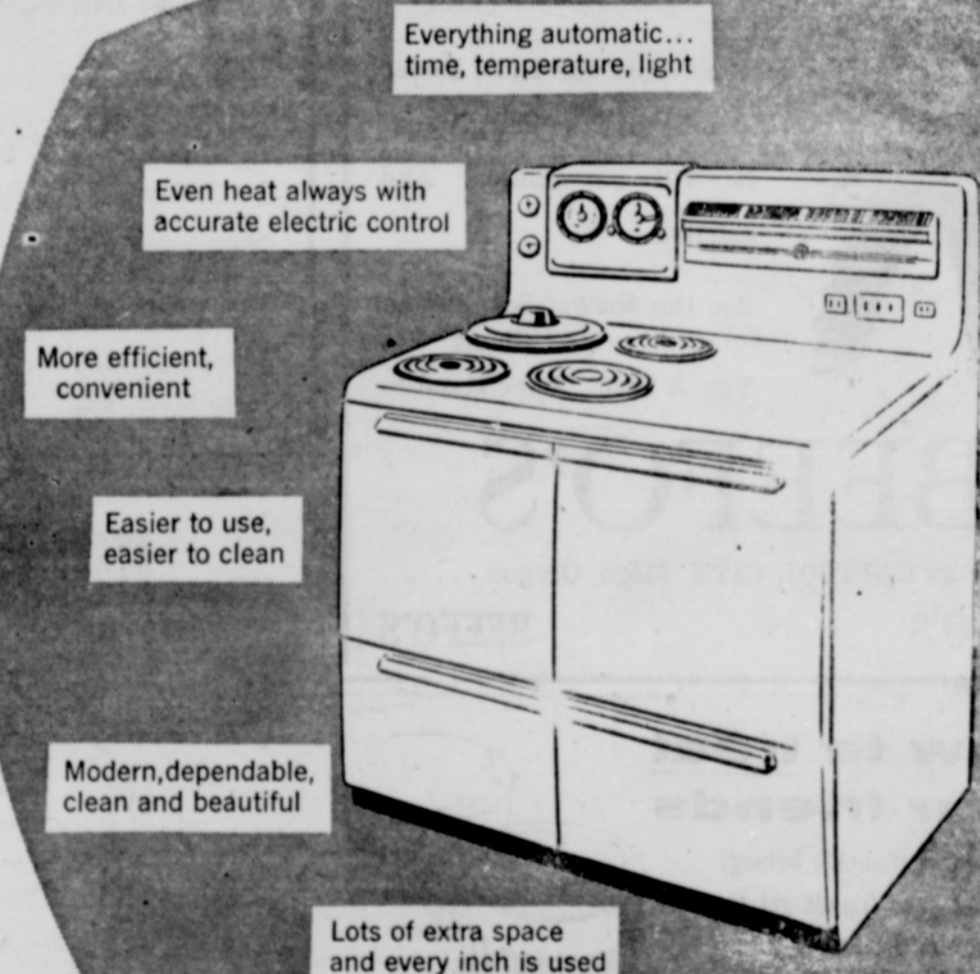
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
