MOTHPROOFING MADE EASY BY NEW CHEMICAL

Mothproofing washable woolens being stored for the summer will be easier this year with the help of a new solution, according to Murle Seales, OSC extension clothing specialist.

The liquid product, EQ-53, was developed by the U. S. department of agriculture. Miss Seales said it is sold under several brand names, but EQ-53 appears prominently on most containers.

The advantage of this insecticide is that it permits pestproofing while laundering by hand or in a machine. A few spoonful in a wash or rinse water leaves a small, invisible quantity of DDT in the wool to ward off insects.

One tablespoonful of the product is used for each pound of wool to be washed. When the wool is immersed in the solution, it picks up and retains enough DDT to make it immune to moths. This treatment protects wool

in storage for a year or more, Miss Seales said. If the woolens are worn, they will be protected for a season unless they are washed or dry cleaned. Then they will need treatment again. The solution leaves no odor in the woolens, and it will not affect shrinking or matting of the fabric.

To avoid irritation of infants' skin, the recommendation is to treat their clothing and blankets only if they are to be stored. Before they are used again, dry cleaning is advised.

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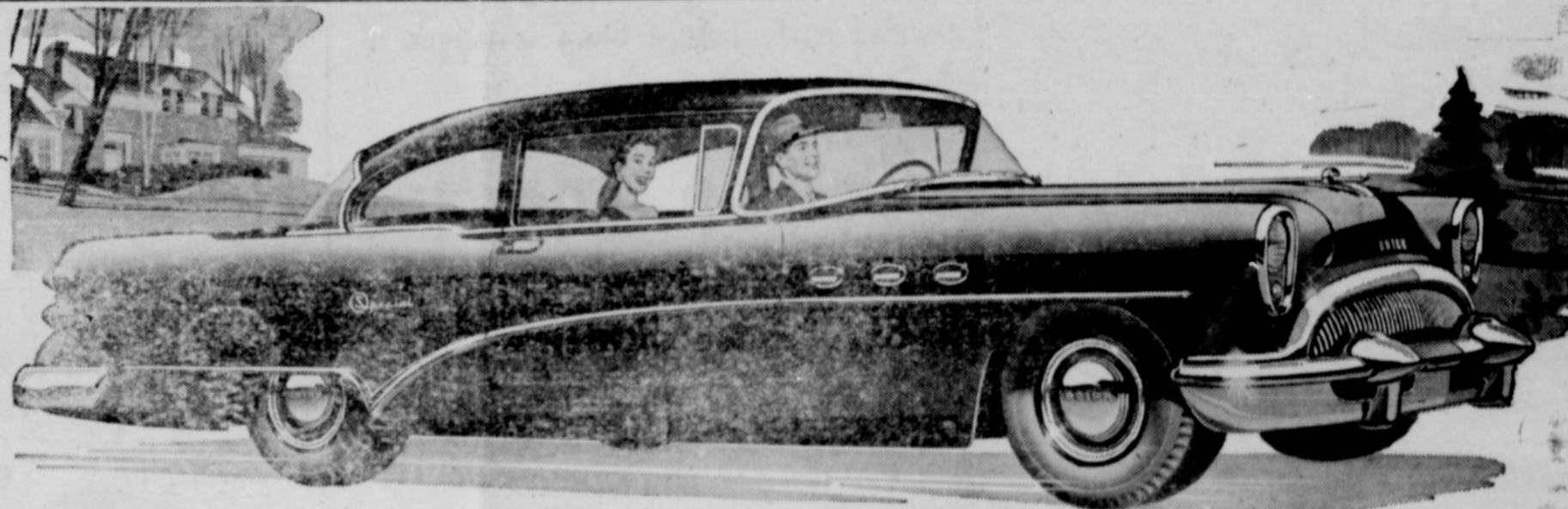
