One of Davis's first chores for the Cubs was to contribute to that record. Davis got credit for a 10-inning 5-4 win for Chicago over the Giants — and Grissom took the loss.

One of the most sportsmanlike gestures recently was the agreement by the Detroit Lions to play college rules when they meet the College All-Stars in the charity football game August 13.

played college ball before starting the play-for-pay game, have had experience in both types of play while the collegians have never played under pro rules.

their farms. • If the vote is no: 1. There will be no marketing quotas and no marketing penalties on "excess" wheat. 2. Price support, under law, will be 50 percent of parity. 3. Any producers who fail to comply with allotments for wheat other crops or total acreage if any is set for their farms, will not be eligible for price support. Acreage allotments in both Oregon and the nation have been cut 11 percent from last year because of holdover supplies of wheat. Oregon's allotment for 1955 is 799,603 acres.

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DRIVERS LOSE LICENSES

Oregon drivers were convicted of 59,353 traffic law violations during the first six months of 1954, driver license authorities reported Thursday.

Convictions for the same period last year numbered 29,409, but officials cautioned the increase does not necessarily mean drivers are violating laws more frequently. Much of the increase is due to improved court reporting of convictions to the state department, they explained.

Included in the six months report was a listing of driver license suspensions. Heading the

list was driving while intoxicated which resulted in 1,415 suspensions. Oregon law calls for mandatory suspension after court conviction of drunk driving.

Another 1,124 persons lost driving privileges on 134 miscellaneous traffic charges, including 292 for reckless driving; 237, failure to report an accident; 195, violation of the basic rule; 49, driving record; 21, disregarding a signal; and 20, violation of instruction permit.

Seventy-nine licenses were cancelled due to violation of license provisions, withdrawal of parent's consent, or court recommendation.

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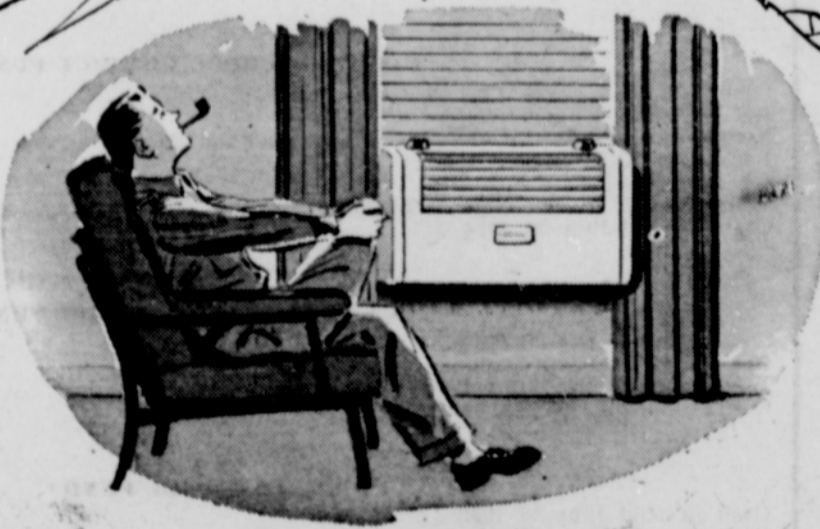
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U. S. National Bank Rules Regulating Deposits Increase Quotas Explained

The U. S. National Bank marked up an increase in deposits of more than 40 million dollars during the 12 months since June 30, 1953.

Deposits now stand at \$640,338,291 for the statewide system. The Dalles and Dufur branches show a combined total of \$17,573,645.42 for the bank's two Wasco county branches, C. A. Reynolds, manager of The Dalles branch, stated.

Loans and discounts now total \$237,295,630 for the system. The Dalles and Dufur branches show a loans and discounts figure of \$5,558,788.00. Growing in all phases of its banking activity, the U. S. National now lists total resources of \$694,976,970 which is a gain of better than 42 million dollars during the past year.

Effects of the marketing quota referendum for wheat growers July 23 have been summarized by Ralph Beck, assistant director of the Oregon State college extension service. He represents the extension service on the state agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

If two-thirds of the nation's wheat growers who cast ballots in the referendum vote yes:

1. Marketing quotas will be in effect for all farms with more than 15 acres of wheat for grain.
2. Marketing penalties will apply to all "excess" wheat—that is wheat that exceeds individual farm allotments.
3. Price support will be given to farmers who comply with wheat acreage allotments—if they also comply with other crop allotments and total acreage allotments that might be set up for

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
