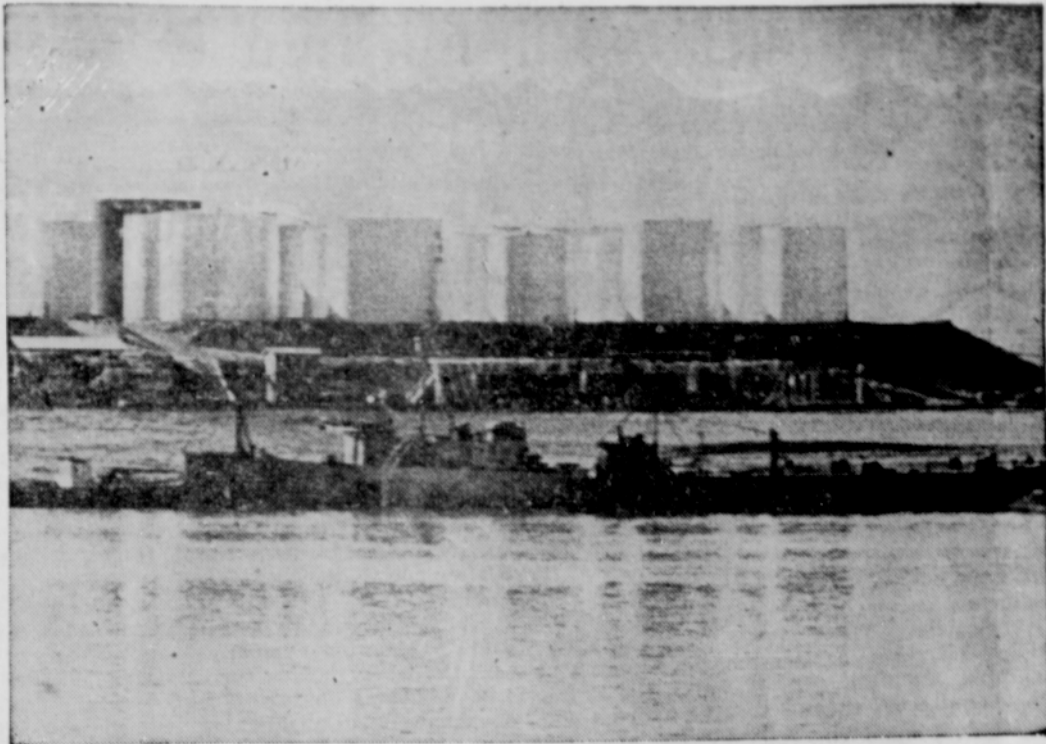

Mrs. Will Fehrenbacher of Gresham passed away suddenly Sunday at a hospital there. Funeral services were held from the Gresham Catholic church at 9 a. m. July 21, and burial made in Gresham.

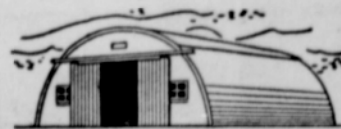
