These Things We Note

Victoria, B. C.: Across the flat bottom of Washington and down the Chehalis river to Gray's Harbor at Aberdeen and Hoquiam where early day loggers, engaged in taking the virgin growth from these deep wooded hills, brawled and reveled. Now serene in the midst of the strike and loggers in town are hoeing their gardens.

Going by Camp Lewis we drove in to visit the place and found it much changed since the time, some 30 years ago, when the writer had an apartment on Montana avenue while engaged in some government work considered important at that time.

Around the Olympic peninsula on the west side. A part of it has never been surveyed and all of it is pretty wild. On the peak of Mt. Olympus 240 inches of precipitation fall annually and on the ocean side they get 140 inches per year to fill the many short rivers and make them as large as the Deschutes although a quarter as long. Quinalt and Hoh Indians live drearily on their reservation; maybe it would have been better to have fought and died.

Port Angeles, where the ferries load hundreds of cars for the trip across to Victoria now filled with thousands of curious humans hoping to get a glimpse of Florence Chadwick, channel swimmer (sic). She takes off before it is light and everyone, in a friendly spirit, hopes she makes it.

A harried hotel clerk who had n't had a room at his disposal for some 30 hours, said people were fools to come so far for so trivial a matter. Stayed at an old governor's mansion, an 1870 governor, whose domicile was more filled with glory than with modernity. Victoria B. C. She didn't make it, but waved cheerfully at the crowds as she was driven up the street on her return, wrapped in her big Hudson Bay blanket coat, white with green and red stripes. Too bad, they yelled, as she passed by the parliament buildings. Had the water been half as warm as their welcome she would have made it easy.

Victoria has many minor features to attract the eye of the visitor, none of them very important historically or scenically. The marine drive has many beautiful spots on it, the old castle has some fine wood inside its stony exterior, the fishing boats are numerous and colorful and Butchart's gardens over whose 25 acres of flowers people wander, the women bored and pretending, the men bored and unpretending. Imagine: 25 acres of flowers, it is like six perfectly cooked steaks, a whole case of whiskey made in cocktails. Well, one must be in temperate about something.

Victoria advertises itself as being a little bit of old England and it may be. Anyway it is different. The people are quiet and well behaved. They dine without juke boxes, drive without speeding, eat without drinking, are polite without being servile, are solvent without juke boxes.

The huge parliament buildings are lighted at night and are beautiful. What they do in them is a question not answered by touring through the long building. There are but 2500 government employees (Oregon has over 7000) but they are putting up new buildings for them right along. The government does not seem to be popular for natives appear to resent the "liberal" government's intention that they cannot shift for themselves.

Vancouver B. C.: Up the island to Nanaimo where the ferry comes across to this town, one of the largest in Canada with a huge harbor running along the many bays and ocean arms which are lined with ship loading docks. They take care of the wheat and coal from the inland here.

On the island the drive along the Saanich arm, called the Mahalat is very pretty, the road running along the hill a thousand feet above the water where fishing boats skim along the long bay. Had the fluffiest omelet at a little inn. Food is not usually so remarkable.

Dedication Of McNary Dam to Be September 23

The McNary Dam dedication committee will be expanded by representatives from all the chambers of commerce within a hundred miles of the dam, if those organizations accept the invitation received this week from James Kuhns of Weston, general chairman of the dedication committee.

Kuhns also recommends that the chambers take the leadership in their own communities in encouraging attendance at the historic event on the Columbia river near Umatilla, Oregon. President Dwight Eisenhower will dedicate McNary dam the morning of September 23.

"The dedication of McNary dam by President Eisenhower will be an event of national importance," Kuhns points out, "by virtue of the size and significance of the project and of the personal participation of the President of the United States."

This large multi-purpose project, constructed under jurisdiction of the army corps of engineers, is one of the major units in the main-control plan for the comprehensive development of the vast water resources of the Columbia river and its tributaries. The McNary navigation lock and four of the ultimately fourteen 70,000-kilowatt generators already are in operation. The fifth generating unit is scheduled to start placing power on the line about the time President Eisenhower is here.

"Both McNary dam and President Eisenhower belong to the people of the United States, not just to the localities in which they are situated," the dedication committee chairman stated. "Neither does McNary dam belong just to Oregon and Washington or to any political party."

Kuhns holds the same viewpoint about the dam's dedication. "This history-making ceremony will be for all the people of the entire Pacific Northwest and for as many others elsewhere in the nation as are able to attend. It will not be an event sponsored, or to be capitalized upon, by any one community or political party."

"For that reason," said Kuhns, "we want all the communities of the region represented by their chambers of commerce in the dedication committee."

WILLIAM FOX PASSES

William Fox of Wasco passed away Monday evening, August 16 at a hospital in The Dalles. Mr. Fox had a slight stroke Wednesday evening and gradually grew weaker until he died.

William Fox was born at Patterson New Jersey October 20, 1861, and came to Wasco with his family in 1902 where he has continuously resided since that time on his fruit ranch on the John Day river. His wife died in 1915 and his daughter Rose kept house for him after her passing.

Mr. Fox is survived by three children, James, George and Rose all of Wasco, 13 grandchildren and 33 grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Good Forest Manners Will Help Preserve Timber and Make Playgrounds For All

Do you like to picnic, camp, fish, swim, ride horseback, or just get out to the quiet beauty of the woods and mountains? There will be 100 million Americans enjoying these pursuits this summer, says County Agent T. W. Thompson. He points out that many more people are visiting forest areas and parks, and that we must all set higher standards in forest manners. Otherwise, the careless visitor, the litter bug, and the vandal may seriously hurt our finest recreation.

Sherman County Extension Agent offers a checklist of good forest manners. It's from Charles R. Ross, Oregon State College farm forestry specialist.

Improved camp ground: Use facilities provided to keep camp clean garbage, cans, etc. Build fires in fireplace or stoves provided. Be sure fire is out before you leave. Tidy up the place, put melon rinds, paper plates, orange and banana peels, bottles, cans, news papers, in the garbage containers provided. Leave table tops as neat and clean as you found them.

Make your own camp: Get a fire permit from nearest Forest Ranger station. Dig garbage and latrine

Grain Cutting In County Nears End

Weather permitting, the next few days should see the harvesting of the 1954 Sherman county grain crop drawing to a close. This is the opinion expressed by some of the concerns closely allied with the industry.

The territory surrounding Wasco and covering most of the north county belt is virtually cleaned up and wheat has been moving to the big terminals from that area at a fairly steady rate.

According to Wendell Balsiger, manager of Moro Grain Growers, at least 90 percent of the crop in the area served by his concern is in storage. The end of this week should see most of the fields hereabouts in stubble.

Some delay in cutting was experienced in the south end of the county due to the rainstorm which struck in the Kent area and farther east.

Sod Waterway Practical Method of Solving Gully Crossings With Harvesting Machinery

If you are having trouble crossing gullies in your fields with your harvesters and other machinery, you may be interested in planting sod waterways next spring to reduce these troubles, points out the soil conservation service. Few realize the benefits and value gained by employment of these structures.

The sod waterway, if properly constructed, will permit the crossing of a draw year after year with the minimum of trouble; cut erosion, and provide feed for cattle in fields. If alfalfa is used in the seeding it will increase the feed value and if properly managed possibly give off a cutting of grass alfalfa hay.

Unlike a wheat seeding, a sod waterway need be shaped and seeded once, rather than year after year. When a draw is plowed in every year, or every other year, the soil is placed in the most likely position to be washed down next time. Thus one is speeding erosion, unless proper protection measures have been taken. A V-shaped ditch an average of three feet wide, three feet deep and one-half mile long represents a loss of 1,320 cubic yards or 9,000 tons of soil.

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OREGON BANKS PRINCIPAL FARM LENDERS IN STATE

Oregon farmers and ranchers continued to go mostly to the state's banks to meet their credit needs during 1953, according to B. C. Pinckney, manager Sherman County Branch, First National County Bank, Portland, who represents the Oregon Bankers association as Sherman county's key banker.

Quoting from the 13th annual farm lending survey of the agricultural commission of the American Bankers association, Mr. Pinckney noted that banks were by far the largest lenders to the states' farmers and stockmen during the year. On December 31, 1953, Oregon banks had loans totaling \$46,594,000 outstanding to farmers; while the insurance companies, the financial agencies with the second largest amount of farm loans outstanding, held only \$29,752,000 at the same time. In addition to their regular lending operations, Oregon banks also held \$20,914,000 in C.C.C. loans under the governments price support program, which is not included in the above bank total.
