Strike Makes Work Situation Cloudy

With more than 25,000 workers involved in labor disputes in mid-July, non-farm employment dropped 17,600 from a month before, according to estimates made by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission in co-operation with the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Based on reports from nearly two thousand representative employers from all over Oregon, the estimates show 444,500 persons in non-agricultural jobs July 15, comparing with 462,100 in June and 488,700 a year ago. Approximately 25,700 were on strike against 700 in 1953.

Logging and sawmill employment in July was estimated at 49,600 comparing with 65,300 in June and 73,600 last year. Plywood and other wood product plants reported 9,000 at work against 14,900 a month before and 16,200 in 1953.

Metals, machinery, food processing and ship repairing each remained about a thousand below last year but little change was shown by most other industrial groups. Transportation and utilities also declined considerably from a year ago.

With 26,900 workers reported, construction gained 2,400 from June but failed to come up to last year's 28,900. Trade also increased from the previous month but at 106,900 was 4,600 behind 1953 totals.

Finance and service showed little change from June, remaining a few hundred higher than a year

ago. State and local governmental June but it 53,100 was 3,200 above employment dropped 1,800 from last year's figures.

Oregon courts convicted 9,959 drivers of violating state traffic laws during July, Secretary of State Newbry reported today.

Among convictions reported were 274 for driving while intoxicated, an offense which calls for mandatory suspension of the driver's license after conviction. Newbry said 140 other drivers lost licenses upon court recom-

mendation for various traffic offenses, including 60 for reckless driving and 24 for violation of the basic rule.

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
