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Special Contests Due At County Fair

Livestock judging, showmanship, and herdsman contests are special features of the 4-H part of the Sherman County Fair, County Agent T. W. Thompson indicated this week.

The livestock judging contest will feature a 1955 4-H Summer School scholarship by the J. K. McKean Company to the winner. All 4-H livestock club members are eligible for competition. Participants will judge classes of hogs, sheep and beef cattle. The three top judges will constitute a county team for participation at the 1954 Pacific International at Portland, October 18-20.

A grand champion 4-H livestock showman will be selected for the 1954 fair. Mt. View Hereford Ranch, Grass Valley, sponsor a plaque for the winner of this contest. Joan Ross, former 4-H club member and now an agricultural student at OSC was 1953 winner.

Champion showmen in the beef, sheep and swine will compete for the grand champion award. Champion showmen awards will be presented by the Equitable Savings and Loan Association, Portland. Awards to be presented are beef-show halter, sheep-wool card, swine-show cane, Thompson indicates.

The showmanship contests are divided into junior and senior divisions with winners of each division participating for champion. The beef cattle showmanship contest is divided into juniors 9 to 13 inclusive and seniors 14 years and over.

Livestock club members will compete individually for cash awards in the herdsman contest for sheep and swine as well as beef. The herdsman contest is to develop more knowledge and skill in the proper handling and stabling of livestock and in the proper care and use of equipment.
