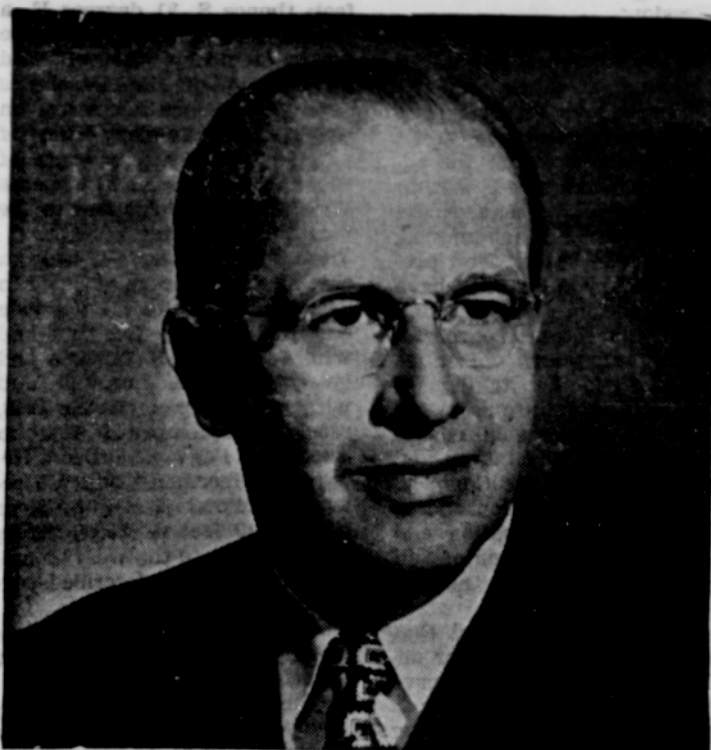




U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson, who will make a major department of agriculture address at 3 p. m. Friday, Septem-
