SCHOOL CLOTHES CARE

With school days here again, many mothers are thinking about how to send their youngsters off to school looking fresh and clean. Laundering those clothes can be a problem and Mary Beth Minden, Oregon State college exten-

sion home management specialist, suggests some ways to save energy and time in home laundering.

For example, careful sorting of clothes before laundering is advised. Look for any rips and tears and mend them before clothes are washed, she says, because they usually become larger during the laundering process. That means a bigger and more difficult mending job later.

Any stains likely to be set by hot water, soap or laundering detergents should be removed in advance, Miss Minden cautions. Heavily-soiled clothes wash cleaner if they have an advance soaking.

For those who live near the beach or in a sandy area, it's generally wise to rid clothes of sand before they go into the machine. Shake out as much dry sand as possible, and dunk sandy garments in pail of lukewarm water. The sand will settle out, according to the home management specialist.

Before washing sort clothes on a table or counter at no-bend height, Miss Minden advises. Sorting on the floor, as is often done, is hard on the back and may add soil to the clothes. Brush out pockets as you sort, close slide

fasteners and remove ornaments that won't stand washing. Then sort according to color, soil and fabric. The day is past when all kinds of fabric can be washed together, she says.

When putting clothes on the line, shake as you hang and hang straight to get out as many wrinkles as possible. Smooth clothes carefully as you take them from

the line and put them in the clothes basket. This saves ironing labor, she explains.

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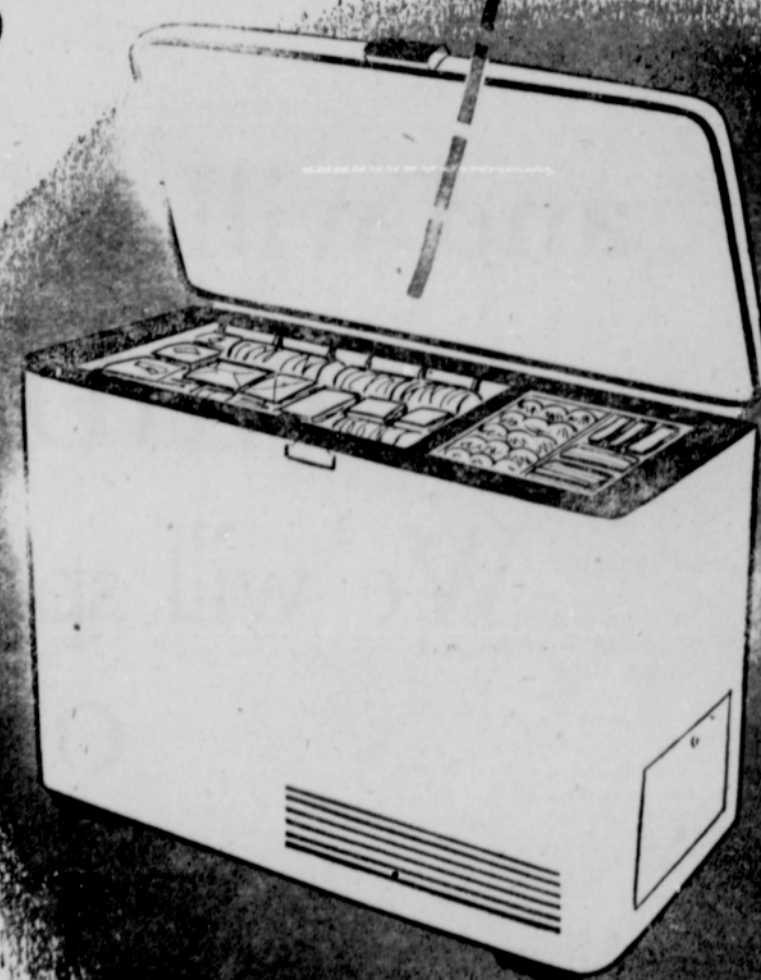
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
