McNARY DEDICATION

It seems like a long while ago when so many Sherman countians went early on a sunny morning to see President Eisenhower and hear him dedicate the huge dam named for Oregon's beloved Charles McNary, senator and senate leader because of his "savvy" and knowledge of how to get along with others.

And because it seems a long time ago it is no longer news. But there were some impressions noted. The arrangements were marvelous, whether due to the army which has a way of handling large groups, or the Pendleton committee, from a town that has some experience with crowds or other factors, the crowd was well handled and best of all there was plenty of room.

The president often sounds dull and without enough expression when heard over a radio. He does not appear so when heard over a crowd mike and seen. He is an active, vigorous man who moved about with alacrity. No one will ever succeed in making us believe that he cannot make up his mind. We do think, however, that he would wait until all the evidence was in. His talk was a plain exposition of his power policy and those in Oregon who have read the articles and learned the facts about power will realize that his policies will help Oregon. The preference clause in the Bonneville act has served to give Washington a large part of Columbia river power; the partnership plan is the only plan so far made that will keep a fair share of it in Oregon.

The introduction by Governor Paul Patterson was one of the best heard in a long life of speech listening. He has the knack of saying something and saying it well which is not an easy accomplishment to master.

The Blue Angels, navy flying exhibition team of four, gave the pre-program crowd a thrill with precision flights at 650 mph; the big bombers impressed by their size which gave a feeling that resistance would be futile; the dam itself is so big that even the statistics cannot describe it, tons of this and carloads of that, are incapable of telling how so mighty a river was dammed.

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POLITICAL PROGRAM

A new light has come onto the farm program since Dick Neuberger gave it his interest. Hitherto the wheat growers have been scorned as living too far apart to be considered. They have been little brothers of the coyote, running from sage brush to sage brush.

Now even the heretofore despised votes of the east Oregonians become valuable and the state's most talkative candidate has evolved a program for wheat. As told up in Umatilla county it comprises: 1. Use surplus farm products instead of tax dollars to feed hungry people overseas and win friends thereby.

In the first place the government buys the surplus to give the farmer an income and the government uses tax dollars to buy the wheat. In the second place our experience at winning friends by gifts of food is an entirely discredited policy.

2. A food stamp system to give surplus foods to needy Americans. Needy Americans prefer cash and the food stamp system was very wasteful. It is bad enough to tell the indigent how much money they can get for relief without telling them what they have to eat.

3. Expanding the school lunch program to give more milk particularly to school children.

4. Study and perhaps use the Canadian family allowance plan which gives food to families with children.

More of the overall plan to have government be father and mother and financial agent for people; paternalism of the simplest sort. We are Americans who still prefer to earn our daily bread and times are good enough that we will over 60 million of us are doing so.

This is autumn, officially since September 21, and unofficially and positively since Tuesday night when the first frost hit the major part of the county.

The geese, wiser than men, go south; animals grow thicker hair or burrow down deep into the ground to sleep during the winter. They adjust to environment; man tries to change it. The animals have never lost sight of their primary purpose in life—to get food and to procreate themselves.

Man has complicated the food and the process of getting it until he cannot leave his business and his employments even for his comforts and enjoyments.

It is man, who calls himself the greatest of all mammals, who must stay up north in the snow and cold, chilled whenever he gets out of his elaborate houses, hampered in getting about, spending his earnings for necessary heat.

Fall would be the prettiest time of year if one could keep from thinking about the winter to come. The trees take on their brightest colors, the fields almost visibly take a rest, often the chill air is bracing and invigorating. The wind stops its blustering and the days are calm and sunny. It is the dread of something after it that cools the ardor for autumn.

And it is upon us. The frosted tomato vines, the ribbed cucumber plants attest it and we must face another winter, which, we are sure will not be as bad as imagined. There will be snow and the spring will be better for it and, as was asked years ago "if winter comes can spring be far behind?"
