Floyd Stow of Bend was here Sunday to visit his father, R. A. Stow, who was a visitor at the Fred Cox home.

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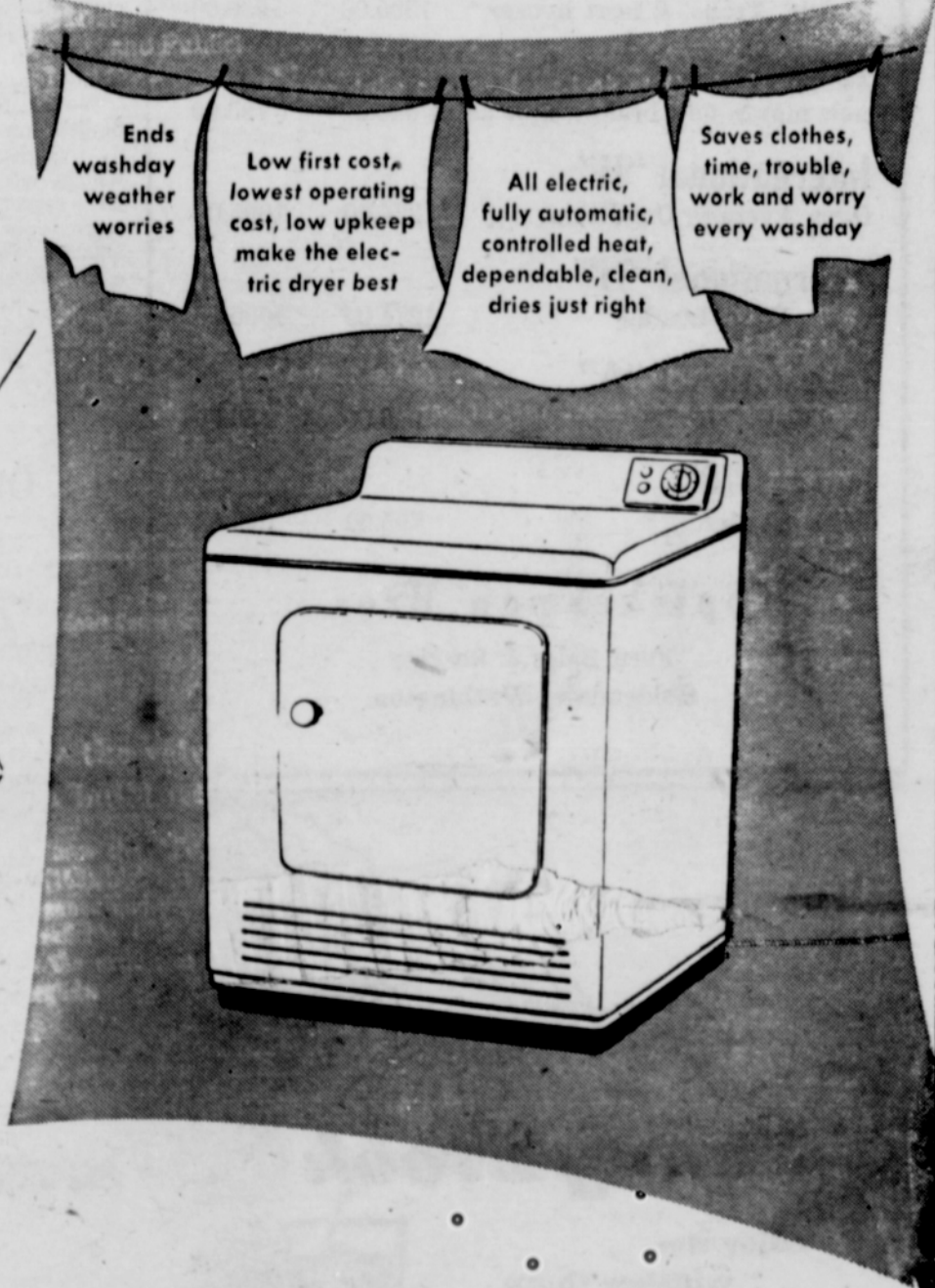
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
