County Ramblin's

Yearling heifers can be bred to calve as two year olds providing they have sufficient size. This adds another calf to the life time production of the cow. Research and lots of practical ranch experience indicate that heifers weighing six hundred pounds or more can be bred and successfully calve as two year olds providing they receive proper feed and management. Select replacement heifers from this years weaners that have plenty of size, quality, flesh, thickness, as well as good straight legs. Give them the right kind and amounts of feed which will require supplemental feeding to keep them growing until maturity. They should be about 600 pounds at the minimum at breeding time. The use of small bodied, small boned bulls is recommended to cut down on calving trouble. Give the heifers special care at calving time.

Sodium Chlorate is still one of the best chemicals for control of small patches of perennial weeds.

or perennial grass. Many farmers could use sodium chlorate yet this fall to control small patches of morning glory and other perennial weeds. Assistance is rendered county farmers through the ACP program if prior application is made indicating the intent to try materials. About one half of the cost of application is paid through the ACP program.
