Mrs. Rose Duthie, OSC housing and employment secretary, reported 1388 men and 273 women were listed for employment. Some 280 men and 110 women were placed in steady jobs.

Pay for part-time work was \$1 an hour minimum up to \$1.50. A slight increase in number of men registered for employment was reported. Full-time summer jobs were most difficult to find this year, Mrs. Duthie said.

"Working students have come to realize that jobs and money are not to be had as easily as in former years and the turnover in steady part-time jobs has been small," Mrs. Duthie reported.

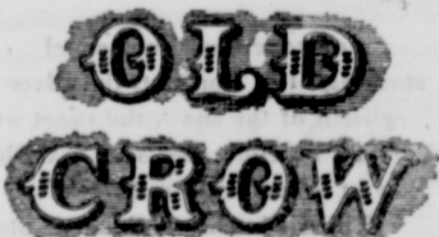
