ANOTHER TAX THEORY

The tax proposal introduced by Representative Pearson is not new and is not the best bill that can be made from the general theory of an all inclusive income tax, but it is a start that may result in a change.

Sales tax advocates have long toyed with the theory that if income taxes could be deprived of any exemptions the same result could be attained by taxing income as by taxing sales. Oddly those stalwart advocates of income tax in preference to a sales tax agree. It must be realized that sales tax opposition stems from prejudice more than from arithmetic.

HB 478 has the failing of making its brackets too large and from giving an exemption of a flat \$10 per dependent. It is also at fault by taxing all income over \$6000 at the full rate of 6 per cent.

A graduated income tax that started with the first dollar earned and at a two percent rate, graduated by \$500 brackets for the first \$1000 or \$2000 and by \$1000 brackets up to \$8000 or \$10,000 would be a better bill and would raise a lot of money. It has long been estimated the amount it would raise. These estimates vary each year, of course, depending on the number of tax returns and the size of them.

There is actually no good reason for an exemption of \$600. The original theory of income tax was that a person was not to pay on his actual and necessary living costs. Exemptions were first placed at \$5000. As inflation grew and living costs went up the exemptions were reduced. No one lives on \$600 anymore and many pay on two-thirds or three-quarters of their living costs. So long as the exemption does not represent living costs there is no reason for them at all.

We have understood that the house taxation committee is considering an amendment to the income tax law that would change brackets and rates and this new bill may become the basis for that change.

A common theory of taxation is to obtain all the down possible from the goose without causing too many squawks or endangering the goose to unexpected cold spells. If Oregon gets more money from its income tax payers it will certainly prevent other geese from lighting in its goose pasture. Men with assured incomes are already moving to California and an increased income tax will certainly boost the traffic south.

NECESSARY NUISANCE
Enforcement of an expanded ruling made under the Hatch act has brought about the resignation of Mayor Darwin Van Gilder and Councilman Virtue. Under the circumstances the ruling is silly. Small town officials very, very seldom have an influence on state or national affairs.

Yet, no one can quarrel with the objective of the law which is to prevent any party or any group from building a political machine from the bottom to the top. No one would favor having any federal official hold a state office, nor a city office in any sizeable city. When applied to small cities where there is a shortage of available talent and willingness to hold office the ruling becomes rather silly even though the principle behind it is laudable.

HELLS CANYON AGAIN
The introduction of a bill authorizing the federal government to build a high dam at Hells Canyon unduly complicates the power situation in the northwest. The John Day dam should be built first because it is on the main stream of the Columbia river and not on a tributary and because there has never been the controversy over it that there has been over Hells Canyon dam.

But Hells Canyon is a sort of symbol to the public power advocates who are apparently going to trust it down the necks of Oregonians if they can. If their greatest interest was in power they would prefer John Day.

There is great engineering doubt about Hells Canyon and very little about John Day; there is

doubt about the distribution from Hells Canyon as it is a long way from any center of population while John Day is right in line with already existing power lines.

Oregon has never been much of a public power state. It's PUDs have failed to attract the interest and the votes they have in Washington for instance. Oregonians have been steadily for private power and have so voted time after time. The argument that the vote for US senator last fall proved otherwise is wishful thinking by public power advocates. In fact the new Hells Canyon bill sounds more like a test of that assumption than like a bill to actually get a dam built.

Oregonians cannot expect the federal government to build all the dams we want without the turning of a hand on their part. Many of them doubt the advisability of it, even if it were possible, because it removes control of the power developed from local residents to Washington D. C. Living in an area whose power, and therefore whose industry, was governed from 3000 miles away would have its drawbacks.

Senators who signed the bill are, in the main, men of the more "liberal" stripe, New Dealers with a philosophy of power centralized in the federal government. It seems probable that they will find that America has turned toward a less totalitarian and more sensible philosophy.

FEDERAL EDUCATION FUNDS
There is probably no limit to the amount of money "educators" would spend on schools if they could get it. There is not necessarily criticism involved because most of us could find ways to spend money if we got it from government. Probably most of those in the teaching profession really feel that their job is the most essential of all, is the savior of civilization, the backbone of the economy and the only hope for the future of the human race.

With so successful an example of self hypnotism it is not surprising that they should demand all the money that can be obtained from every source. To them education is the panacea that will cure all ills of the world including the end of war, the equalization of taxes, racial distrust, social inequities and moral failings.

When some mean old cynic points to the record which shows no improvements in the ills of society in spite of continued and expanded education they merely point out that all this will be cured by more education.

Efforts to snare the federal budget in the behalf of local school districts is one of the later moves of the more insatiable advocates of more money for what is so pompously called education. We hope they never get a dime. With federal money flowing into the present system of teaching children it would be almost impossible to obtain the examination into the purposes and methods of education which is so badly needed.

MORE ACCURATE APPRAISAL
The house at Salem has defeated a bill prepared for the interim tax study committee which would have made it necessary to assess property every four years at least and would have had it done by certified appraisers, meaning those who had passed an examination.

To those who have been trying for years to get the appraisal of real and personal property in Oregon on a realistic basis this was but another defeat of a long list of them. Reappraisal still goes on—will, but haltingly until those who are paying more than they should awake and decide to help.

There are counties in Oregon where appraisals have not been made in years, where the roll is copied year after year with minor or with percentage changes. That is not assessment and not even much bookkeeping.

It is true that assessment of property in Oregon is sort of public conspiracy. Everyone gets low assessment and everyone thinks he is favored thereby. No one wants to change it and the assessors, being politically chosen, have no intention to start a reform movement.

If a man has land that he can sell for \$200 per acre that is valued at \$40 for assessment purposes he is happy about it even though a neighbor with equally good land is assessed at \$30 per acre. Assessments are but one factor in the tax bill. There is millage. And before any or all of them can be taxes there must be a levy.

Taxes come from levies made by county courts, city councils, school districts and in former days, the legislature. Fair assessments do not hurt anyone and unfair assessments cannot help but hurt some one.

We have often contended that there should be a taxpayers group in each county, that it should watch taxes in good times so that they wouldn't get so big they contributed to poor times. Defeat of this bill makes that need greater than ever.

People's Column

Tuesday March 8, 1955 I gave to the city council of Moro, my resignation as mayor. It has been such a short time since the election in November that I feel I owe you an explanation. When I accepted the nomination it was without the knowledge that some departments of the State of Oregon required their employees to refrain from taking part in local government. It was brought to my attention after having served several years on the council and as mayor by appointment.

I have enjoyed working with the members of the council on the various phases of city improvement. It is a challenge to take a city budget and plan how you can get the most from it for the people. Even more it was a satisfaction to the council last year to be able to reduce the budget by around a thousand dollars and still go ahead with our program.

I want to thank the citizens of Moro for the willing cooperation and help they have given me and for the splendid vote I received last November.
